

LA Council OK's Career Program

A career night program for liberal arts students, "Time to Think About the Future," has been approved by the Liberal Arts Student Council.

The program, to be held Thursday night, Dec. 19, in the Hetzel Union auditorium, will be aimed primarily at seniors, but will be open to all LA students.

According to the report submitted Tuesday by Sandra Gusky, committee chairman, there will be three main sessions:

● A general address by Donald Cook, assistant placement director.

● A panel discussion by four industrial or business leaders to be followed by an open question session.

● A coffee hour after the panel discussion at which time students may speak to the panel members. Cook will speak on opportuni-

ties available to LA students, their wages and how to take their interviews.

In other business, the council unanimously moved to support a resolution favoring a possible Parents Association. The University is now raising funds from parents for the Stone Valley recreation project.

Robert Nurock, president of the council, reported that since the newly revised constitution provides for seven instead of six freshmen on the council, the executive committee has decided to seat the seventh-highest vote-getter. The new member is Martha Yeager, freshman in arts and letters from Charleston, W. Va.

The executive committee had also advocated the election of a corresponding secretary and a

treasurer, new offices which were established in the changed constitution. In preliminary nominations, Patricia O'Neill, junior in journalism from Staten Island, N.Y., was nominated for corresponding secretary and William Jaffe, sophomore in journalism from Philipsburg, was nominated for treasurer.

Sandra Shogren, the present secretary, will become recording secretary.
