

# AIM Board Hears Candidacy Proposal

A motion to require future Association of Independent Men presidents to have served at least two semesters on the AIM Board of Governors before election was presented — then withdrawn — at a board meeting Tuesday.

Jacob Hostetter, a member of the AIM Constitutional Committee, withdrew his motion after discussion by the board, saying his purpose in bringing the motion to the board's attention had been accomplished.

AIM president John Morgan told board members since the AIM Constitution is scheduled to be revised within a few weeks, the matter should be discussed in a joint meeting of the Executive and Constitutional Committees.

Hostetter said he believes the AIM president should have some previous experience on the board before entering office.

In other business, Morgan distributed copies of rules and procedure for a proposed AIM Outstanding Living Unit Award. He asked each board member to study the program before the next governors meeting.

The award would be presented to the outstanding male independent undergraduate residence hall unit.

The winners would be determined under a point system by a committee of three representatives of the Board of Governors, two counselor coordinators and a representative from the dean of men's office.

William B. Crafts, assistant to the dean of men in charge of fraternity affairs, spoke to the board on student government and its limitations.

He indicated little direct connection between the structure of the administration and that of student government.

The election was a complete reverse of last fall's results. Lion party then took five of the six posts, losing only the office of freshman class secretary-treasurer to Campus party.

Hollander called for Cabinet members to commit the "crime of deliberation" and postpone discussion until Dec. 5.

Hart seconded Hollander's sentiments. "Fools rush in where angels fear to tread," said Hart.

Associate Dean of Men Harold W. Perkins, on behalf of Cabinet's administrative advisers, assured Cabinet that the Senate would not be taking action on the compulsory program at its Dec. 5 meeting.

He urged Cabinet members to be "deliberate" and to "get as much information as you can." This is an "opportunity for real statesmanship," he said.

After Perkins' remarks, Cabinet proceeded to kill Walker's amendment and then, with four dissenting votes, agreed to Hollander's motion to postpone until Dec. 5.

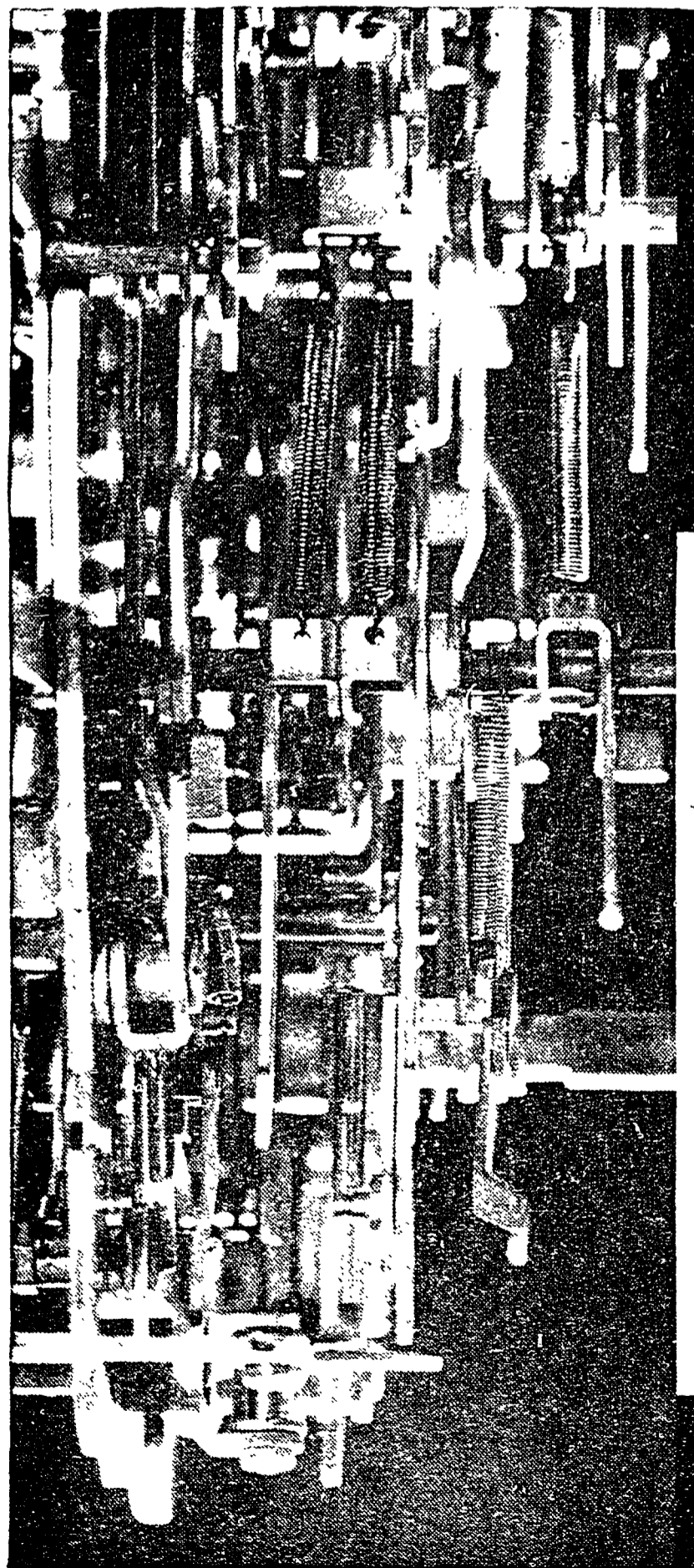
