The meat judging team took second place in the show.

High man in the entire contest was Thomas McElwain, senior in animal husbandry from Apollo. Third highest scorer in the entire competition was Kermit Yearick, senior in animal husbandry from Mill Hall.

The University teams "monopolized" the beef cattle judging with McElwain winning top individual honors: Thomas Blose, senior in animal husbandry from Glen Campbell, winning second place; and Leslie Firth, senior in animal husbandry from Sugar Grove, taking third place.

Others on the livestock judging team were Tony Dobroski, senior in animal husbandry from Avonmore, Richard Fowler, senior in animal husbandry from Danville and Sidney Shade, senior in animal husbandry from Gettysburg.
