

12 Additional Tielines TV Plan— Ordered for Phones

W. F. Diehl, manager of telephones, told the West Halls Council last night that eight new tielines between University and residence halls systems have been ordered.

Diehl said the 12 tielines now in use cannot give adequate service. He said after the new tielines are put in, eight of

them will be available for calls going from University lines to residence halls, seven will be two-way lines and five will be for calls from residence halls to University lines.

Diehl said a new dial phone system will be installed by the time the new men's residence halls are completed.

He said under the present system there are two switchboards.

The University board has a capacity of 2000 lines and the residence halls board has a capacity of 1500 lines, Diehl said.

According to Diehl, there are 65 trunk lines from the residence halls to State College and 50 trunk lines from University to State College. He said the University switchboard is a four-position board and the residence halls board is an eight-position board.

Each of the operators on the residence halls board can handle 15 calls, which makes a total of 120 calls that can go through that board at one time, he said.

To show the average number of calls that are handled during a certain period of time, Diehl gave a report of a survey taken the week of Oct. 17, 1955. According to the survey, 6007 calls were handled between 6

and 10 p.m. during one evening.

Diehl said 2325 of these calls were from residence halls extensions to other residence halls extensions, 2321 were from town to residence halls, 661 from residence halls to town coin boxes, 147 were from University to residence halls, 145 were long distance collect calls from residence halls, 113 were from residence halls to University, 74 were information calls, 47 were paid long distance calls and 74 were miscellaneous calls.

In telling of the general extension program, Keller said the University is now being pressured for more centers and for expansion of present centers.

"This is a problem that will have to be solved," he said. "The expansion of the centers will have to keep pace with advances made by the University."

Farrell, in discussing research plans, said the Russian scientific advances should "shake us out of our lethargy" regarding basic research. He predicted that three times as much research will be conducted in 1970 as now.

He said the University needs funds so that in future years nearly every staff member will carry on both instruction and research.

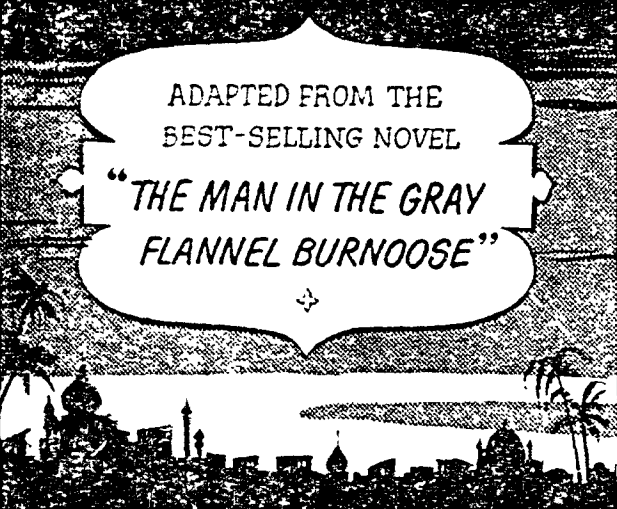
