

Cutler Calls Gen Ed 'Major Revolution'

General education, a policy recently accepted and applied by the University, is described as a "major revolution in American undergraduate education" by Dr. Howard A. Cutler, coordinator of general education.

Cutler, who is also head of the Department of Economics, spoke in June to the Board of Trustees on the University's application of the policy. His speech was printed in the November issue of the Alumni News.

General education began as a revolt against overspecialization, Cutler said. The two main issues underlying the policy are a demand that the student be put before the subject matter and an accusation that the wrong subject matter was being emphasized.

"Penn State has not been a leader in the general education movement," Cutler said. "It comes to the scene late."

The University's program was initiated by a Senate subcommittee of faculty representatives from each of the colleges. This group prepared a policy statement of general education which was accepted by the Senate in December 1954.

A few months later the Senate and the Board of Trustees approved a statement of educational policy which defined general education as that part of education designed to develop a man's knowledge and capacities, rather than to train him for the particular purpose of following an occupation.

Cutler said the present problem is to implement the policy with an active program. This means:

• "Inspiring the faculty and students to their highest stature, through realization of the principles of general education as set forth in the policy statement."

• "Helping each faculty member, and through him each stu-

dent, to be aware of the general education aims that can be achieved in each course that is offered."

• "The recognizing, encouraging and rewarding of experimentation and presentation of courses and the course-requirements of various curricula."

Cutler said: "The University has always fed this stream of general education. It will now simply attempt to do so more consciously, more fully, and more satisfactorily."

"The student," Cutler concluded, "our primary concern, stands to gain through the greater opportunities provided for increased knowledge and direction in the development and realization of his fuller self."
