# Kruschy Claims Sputnik in U.S.

MOSCOW, Dec. 6 (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev declared tonight part of the carrier rocket of Sputnik I fell in the United States Sunday and the Americans won't give it back.

The Communist party secretary emphasized he meant the United States itself, not simply the American continent.

"We relied on them, trusting in their decency, but they did not live up to our trust," he remarked.

In Washington, a State Department spokesman disclaimed any knowledge of the rocket hitting U.S. soil. A spokesman for the Vanguard satellite project said there was no evidence the fragment hit the United States. Khrushchev said the Soviet government will ask the United States to return the fragment.

## Dulles OK's Visits To Red China Captives

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles reversed himself today and decided that "close relatives" of six Americans held in Red China would be granted passports to visit the prisoners.

This pre-Christmas action was the third move at the State Department within six months to lower travel bars between the United States and the Chinese Communist mainland.

# Holland Requests Indonesian Talks

The Netherlands government called yesterday for an emergency meeting of its North Atlantic Council allies to discuss developments in Indonesia, according to the Associated Press. Members of the council agreed to meet in Paris today.

Meanwhile, in Jakarta, Indonesia, the Indonesians began driving out the Dutch rear guard which held on after colonial days and ran the nation's rich oil, rubber and business empires.
