

# Columbia Prof Discusses Segregation

The policy of apartheid or racial separation in South Africa is essentially the story of a people with technological superiority taking over and exploiting people with a less technically advanced civilization, according to Dr. Edmund S. Brunning, professor of sociology at Columbia University.

Brunning, who is also chairman of the Bureau of Applied Social Research, spoke Tuesday at a public meeting sponsored by religious and international relations organizations. The program was part of a worldwide day of protest against the apartheid policy and coincided with the United Nations Human Rights Day.

Brunning said that the situation in South Africa is "one of the most fascinating sociological problems in the world." It

is the idea of making a minority's culture, in this case that of the Afrikaners or Boers, completely dominant both on the colored majority and on other whites, such as the British, as well, Brunning stated.

He also said the Afrikaners feel the advantage they have gained should be continued. In a government report he cited, it was suggested that there be a complete separation of whites and non-whites. This was to be accomplished by establishing completely colored states on the British jungle reservations with the domination of the "superior" whites. To point out the chaos in the present government, Brunning said this report was first accepted

and then repudiated by the government.

In the government's urge to spread the apartheid policy as much as possible, Brunning said, it is affecting education, labor, the professions and the economy to such an extent that the whites may forego support of the Afrikaner party.

Brunning quoted an official of an American auto assembly plant as saying that 16 per cent of costs could be saved by using native labor, which is now prohibited. When an Afrikaner was asked by Brunning how South Africa could allow loss of labor with its resultant harm the Afrikaner said, "If by doing God's will we will suffer, let us suffer."
