

UCA, de Levie Will Sponsor 3 Summer European Seminars

The University Christian Association will sponsor two European seminars this summer.

A 47-day "Introduction to Europe" seminar from July 9 to Aug. 25 will emphasize political, educational and religious patterns and a 42-day "Perspectives in Art and Architecture"

seminar from June 19 to July 21, will study historical and modern art and architecture.

Dr. Howard Cutler, head of the Department of Economics, will lead the Introduction to Europe seminar and William Hajjar, professor of architecture, will head the Perspectives in Art and Architecture seminar.

Cost of the Introduction to Europe seminar will be about \$995 per student and the Perspectives in Art and Architecture seminar will cost approximately \$975 per student.

The prices include transatlantic air transportation, accommodations in second-class hotels or university dormitories, meals, and admissions to museums and various programs.

Brochures with detailed itinerary and program and applications are available at the UCA office in the Eisenhower chapel.

Applications will be accepted until March 1. A \$25 registration is required, but will be returned if the application is not accepted.

The Introduction to Europe seminar will visit England, France, Germany, Yugoslavia, Italy, the Swiss Alps, Holland and the World's Fair in Belgium. The Perspectives in Art and Architecture seminar will visit the same countries with the exception of the Swiss Alps and Yugoslavia. Applications for the seminars are available to all students.

Dr. Dagobert de Levie, associate professor of German, will head a 1958 student tour of Europe, scheduled to depart from New York, by air, on June 19 and to return Aug. 1.

The tour, which will consist of visits to eight countries, will feature stops at the

Strait of Messina, Sicily; Mount Vesuvius, Pompeii; the Riviera; Swiss and Austrian Alps and the Rhine Valley.

The itinerary for the tour will include Sicily, which was not included in a similar tour conducted last year.

Participating students will stay in good hotels with two persons sharing a room.

They will use first class rail transportation on the continent as well as a sightseeing bus along the Riviera.

The educational program provides among other things for a visit to the English Parliament, Radio Free Europe in Munich and an audience with Pope Pius XII in Rome.

De Levie has advised early registration as the number of tour members is limited in order to maintain a small party atmosphere.

In 'Fine' Mood, Town Police Catch 237 Area Residents

State College borough police must have been in a "fine" mood during November.

Borough police work resulted in fines for 237 persons on 36 different violations during the month, the highest number recorded in recent months. They ranged from having a dog at large to having a "loose load."

Forty-six persons were fined for parking against traffic and 38 were fined for speeding.

Among the more unusual arrests were those for an obscured windshield, no illumination for registration plates, no flaps and operating a bicycle without a lighted lamp.

IBM Donates Magnetic Drum

A new \$25,000 magnetic drum has been donated to the Computer Laboratory by the International Business Machines Corporation to replace the drum which the firm gave the University two years ago.

The magnetic drum is used in the digital computer to store 11-decimal digit numbers and instructions.

It is capable of storing 2500 of these quantities at one time. The drum rotates at 12,600 revolutions per minute and the average waiting time for a number after it is called for is reported to be 2.4 thousandths of a second.

Replacement Sought For Borough Post

The State College Chamber of Commerce has sent letters soliciting suggestions for a replacement for an executive secretary.

Eugene Fulmer, the former executive secretary, resigned last month reportedly to take advantage of other business opportunities.
