

Soph Fined \$145 For Topsy Driving

A sophomore was placed on two year's probation by Centre County Court yesterday and was ordered to pay a \$100 fine and \$44.50 costs for driving while under the influence of alcohol.

Herbert Bush Jr., sophomore in mechanical engineering, from Reading, was sentenced after previous charges by State College police of careless and reckless driving and failure to obey a traffic signal after sideswiping a borough police cruiser.

Judge R. Paul Campbell ordered that Bush's driving license be suspended for a year and that he obtain a sponsor and report at least once a month to Paul Zimmerman, county probation and parole officer.

Another student, Thomas Jeffrey, senior in animal husbandry from Drexel Hill, pleaded guilty to a charge of prowling at night in the West College Avenue area. Campbell, however, ordered a pre-sentence investigation of the case.

Bush appeared last night before Tribunal on a charge of conduct detrimental to the University.

The sophomore was arrested shortly after midnight on Dec. 20 on his way back from a cocktail party at Klinger Heights. He said he felt capable of driving.

Bush had taken a bluebook on the night of Dec. 19 and went to the party after the bluebook. Police said Bush, driving west on College Ave., sideswiped the police cruiser parked near the main campus gate. Bush, apparently not knowing he hit the car, then went through a red light at Atherton Street, police said.

Police followed Bush, arrested him and placed him in the borough jail overnight. After a hearing before Justice of the Peace Guy B. Mills, Bush was fined \$25 for careless and reckless driving, and \$5 costs for failing to obey the traffic signal and bound over for county court on \$200 bail for driving under the influence of alcohol. He also paid \$17.50 for damage to the police car.
