

Senators Await Poll By Panhel on Audits

The controversial compulsory audit question was postponed again yesterday by the Senate Committee on Student Affairs, to allow Panhellenic Council to prepare a report on sorority auditing practices.

Grace Antes, Panhel president, told the committee yesterday that a report similar to the one presented by the Interfraternity Council would be compiled by Panhel for the next Senate meeting, sometime in February.

The IFC report, presented to the committee by Richard Christian, chairman of the IFC audit committee, included the results of a questionnaire sent to fraternities on the audit proposals.

The audit question was postponed at the last Senate meeting after members of the committee asked for figures from sororities on the issue, and also asked for a complete report of the fraternity figures. Christian's report at its initial presentation showed only about 50 per cent representation by fraternities.

The compulsory audit issue began after the Senate had recommended that all student organizations be required to have their books audited annually and submit the figures of the audit to the University. This applied to both fraternities and sororities.

The IFC then passed a resolution that all fraternities be required to have the annual audit, and submit proof of the audit to the University, but without releasing the actual audit figures. The council passed this resolution unanimously, after adding the clause that the books could be audited by the national fraternity office.

This was the proposal Christian presented to the Senate. The fate of the IFC counterplan is still in the air, postponed to await the sorority report.

Pinball Machines To Help Training Of EE Students

Pinball machines, confiscated as gambling devices, will help in training electrical engineers at the University.

Harold L. Ergott, Jr., research associate in electrical engineering, explains the relays and certain electronic devices used in the construction of the multiple-coin type machines are useful in building electronic devices. They will be used by the engineering students in constructing miniature computers.

The 13 machines, which were confiscated in Lawrence County and ordered destroyed by the court, were turned over to Ergott. He had petitioned the court to permit him to keep the interior workings of the machines for use in teaching design of switching circuits, functions and systems to electrical engineering students.

He will speak Monday on the subject of the "Origins of the Skyscraper" and speak informally to seminar groups on Tuesday and Wednesday.

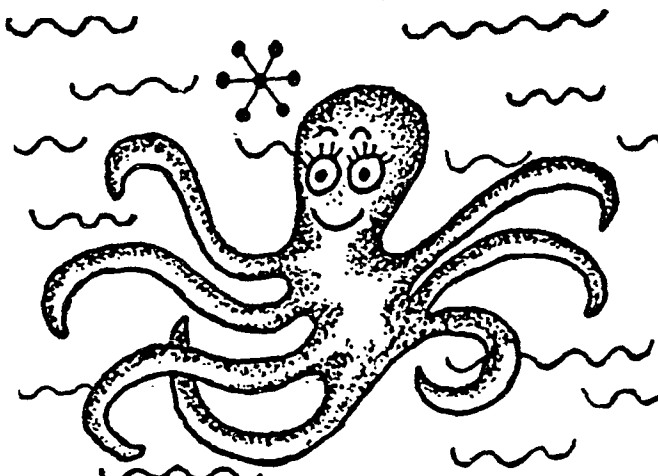
Auditions Planned By Chapel Choirs
