Chamberlain Leads Cage Scoring Race

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—Wilt Chamberlain's glandular infection that has kept him out of the lineup has been a major factor in two straight setbacks suffered by the Kansas Jayhawks.

But The Stilt's inactivity has not threatened his individual lead in the college basketball scoring race.

NCAA figures released today show Chamberlain still the pace setter with 322 points in 10 games for a 32.2 point average.

None of his closest competitors, Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati, Don Hennon of Pittsburgh and Leo Byrd of Marshall, was able to gain ground.

Robertson is in second place with a 29.7 average followed by Hennon with 27.4 and Byrd 26.8. The figures include games through Tuesday.

Ralph Crosthwaite of Western Kentucky is the leader in field goal accuracy with a .636 mark. Kenny Sidwell of Tennessee Tech is the leading free throw marksman with a .909 percentage.

Alex Ellis of Niagara has recovered 199 rebounds for an over all .259 average to lead in that department.

Marshall has put together the highest team scoring average, 89.3, while San Francisco is tops in team defense, yielding only 48.8 points a game.

Sigma Chi, being pushed by no one, defeated Delta Theta Sigma in Wednesday night's Fraternity League B Bowling finals to easily clinch the championship for the fall keg season.

With a season record of 34-10, Sigma Chi had an average of 726. Tony Agnone led the squad in scoring with a pins-total of 5261—and an average of 157 for 33 matches. Other members of the team—Jim Keith, Jim Jordy, Jack Burger, Denny Halterman, and Bill Head—were also consistent scorers.

In other Wednesday matches, Delta Chi beat Phi Kappa Psi, 4-0; Sigma Pi defeated Alpha Gamma Rho, 3-1; Delta Tau Delta won over Phi Kappa, 4-0; Alpha Sigma Phi defeated Theta Chi, 4-0; and Phi Epsilon Pi beat Tau Kappa Epsilon, 3-1.
