

# Board Names 2 Buildings; OK's Construction of 3d

The Board of Trustees has named two buildings and approved construction of a telephone headquarters behind Boucke Building.

The proposed military science building will be named for the late Lt. H. Edward Wagner, a University graduate who died in France in 1944.

The new structure, for which ground will be broken in the Spring, will provide office space and classrooms for the Army, Air Force and Navy ROTC programs. It will be constructed by the General State Authority, the borrow-and-build branch of the state government.

The structure, which will be built along Three Mile Road directly to the east of the University flower gardens, will consist of a basement and three floors. Wagner, a graduate of John Harris High School in Harrisburg, received his bachelor of arts degree in arts and letters in 1941. He was elected to Phi Eta Sigma, Phi Beta Kappa, scholastic honor society; and Delta Sigma Pi, professional commerce fraternity.

He also served as president of the Interfraternity Council and president of his social fraternity, Phi Delta Theta. He was assistant manager of track and of football and was a member of Lion's Paw, Skull and Bones and Blue Key, campus societies.

Wagner completed his basic training at Camp Croft, S.C., was selected for Infantry Officers' Candidate School at Ft. Benning, Ga., and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Infantry in March, 1942.

He was promoted to first lieutenant later in 1942 and volunteered for assignment with a paratroop unit. He landed in Normandy on "D" Day, June 6, 1944, and was killed in action in France on June 28, 1944.

Following World War II, his mother, Mrs. Maude B. Wagner, also prvide facilities for the campus patrol.
