

UBA Will Receive 500 More Textbooks

The Used Book Agency will accept only about 500 more books for sale.

The limit has been imposed because of the large number of books already at the UBA and because students have been walking off with the price slips necessary to place the books, on sale, according to Ronald Kolb, UBA manager.

More than 12,000 books already have been received with the deadline for bringing in books set at 5 p.m. Tuesday if the limit is not reached before then.

Sales are already well ahead of last semester. In a day and a half of selling, more than 4000 books have been purchased.

Students who have already bought their books and find that they do not have the required book for their course may make exchanges on Friday and Saturday. The last day to buy books is Saturday.

The UBA has taken steps to insure the proper use of remaining book price slips. They will now only be available at the turn-in desk. Students who have excess slips are urged to return them to the UBA.

The UBA and the Book Exchange will be open from 9 a.m.

Agreement Approved for TV Courses

The Board of Trustees has approved an agreement between the University and Triangle Publications, Inc., of Philadelphia providing for the broadcast of television programs from the University.

Dr. William G. Mather, professor and head of the department of sociology, will conduct a Sociology 1 course this semester which will be carried over Station WFBG-TV in Altoona as the first program under this agreement. Triangle Publications is the licensee for Station WFBG-TV. Microwave facilities will be installed from the WFBG-TV transmitter building in Altoona to the Penn State Center in Altoona, making possible transmission of closed-circuit television programs from the University Campus to the Center.

Triangle Publications will supply the University with a kinescopic recorder and also will contribute \$10,000 a year to the University as financial support for the television project.
