

University Sets Rule On Waste Disposal

A new University policy makes each employe responsible for getting rid of waste materials in his possession which should not be disposed of through routine channels.

The administration of the policy, according to Dean Os-sian R. Mackenzie, vice president for business administration, is the function of the newly created Department of Security.

Flight Program Uses Air Strip For 1st Time

The Air Force and Army flight instruction program has been started with Cadet Charles A. Nycum, senior from Johnstown, the first student to take off from the new air strip where the training is being offered.

Twenty-two Air Force and three Army cadets are enrolled in the program, which will be in full operation during this semester.

Air Force cadets have completed the ground instruction and the Army students will complete the ground work during the semester.

The program, authorized under a 1956 Congressional act, will provide cadets with 36½ hours training in light aircraft which may qualify them for their private pilot's license.

Plans call for students to make application for the program during their junior year and to complete their training during their senior year.

The program is being conducted on a voluntary basis only.

Dr. Robert Strotz, professor of economics at Northwestern University will speak to the Economics Seminar at noon today in Dining Room A of the Hetzel Union Building.

Strotz, who is also editor of *Econometrica*, will speak on "The Role of Stereotypes in Welfare Economics."

UBA Curtails Taking Books; Sales Continue

The Used Book Agency stopped taking books at 11 a.m. yesterday. The book slips and receipts have been used up and there are no longer any facilities for keeping records of the books coming in. The agency originally planned to stop taking books at 5 p.m. today.

The UBA will continue selling books until noon next Saturday. They will give money to students who sold books and return unsold books from 1 p.m. Feb. 17 to 4 p.m. Feb. 21.

Ronald Kolb, UBA manager, said that about 13,000 books were entered for sale at the UBA this semester. This does not include the books for 50 cents and under for which there is no handling charge.

Kolb also estimated that yesterday's sales totaled between 4000 and 5000 books. "Sales are always heaviest on the first day of classes," he said.

The UBA is a non-profit organization operated once each semester by the Book Exchange.

The UBA charges both buyers and sellers a handling charge of 10 cents for each book.

Registration Deadline Set for Formal Rush

Today is the last day for women students interested in participating in the formal rush program Feb. 8-10 to complete registration. They may do so from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Atherton Hall.

Pre-registration was held last semester but rushees need to present a transcript of their grades to complete registration. A 2.3 all-University average is required for freshmen and a 2.0 for upperclassmen.

Two hundred women have registered to date out of 400 who signed up during the pre-registration period according to R. Mae Schultz, assistant to the dean of women.

Formal rush events include open houses, chatter dates, parties and coffee hours.

Open houses in all sorority suites from 1:30-5 p.m. Saturday; 6:30-8 p.m. Sunday will kick off the rushing program.

No invitations are required and afternoon dresses or suits and heels may be worn.

Chatter dates by invitation in the suites begin on Feb. 10. The first round will be held from 1:30-5 p.m.; and 8:30-8 p.m. Feb. 10 and 11. The second round will run from 1:30-5 p.m. and

6:30-8 p.m. Feb. 13 and 14. School clothes are appropriate.

Parties in the suites will be held from 6:30-7:30 p.m. and 8-9 p.m. The dress will be in accord with the kind of party described on the invitation.

Coffe hours are scheduled Feb. 20 from 6:30-8 p.m. and 8:30-10 p.m. in the homes of alumnae. Formals will be worn. Ribboning on Feb. 21 will end the formal rush program.

Invitations for chatter dates, parties and coffee hours must go through the Panhellenic post office in Atherton.

Amounts of materials which, in the opinion of the responsible employe, are dangerous, toxic, explosive or incompatible with general refuse must be specially escorted and transported to the waste disposal area by a person who understands the disposition of such materials.

If there is any question concerning the harmful effects of any substances transported to the designated disposal area, the responsible employe must render such materials harmless.

Where vehicles for transporting waste materials are not available in the department, arrangements for engaging a vehicle will be made with Physical Plant.

In case of an emergency where dangerous materials have been inadvertently placed in the sewage disposal system, the University power plant may be notified immediately. The power plant staff has an established alert system for carrying out emergency procedures.

Last year about 175,000 fish were killed when poisonous chemicals were inadvertently dumped into Spring Creek by the Naval Ordnance Research Laboratory through the University's sewers.
