

'Burning Bright' to Open Tonight

John Steinbeck's play "Burning Bright," will be presented by Players at 8 tonight at Center Stage.

The play, a 3-act drama, will be presented six times. Mark Wallace, a graduate student in theater arts, is directing the play in partial fulfillment of his requirements for a master of arts degree.

A delicate theme of sex is shown in the play by the presentation of sterility in a strange quadrangle of love, friendship and marriage. The universality of the theme is shown in the play by having a continued story line portrayed in three settings representing three moods of life—a circus performer, a farmers and seafaring people.

An interesting feature of the play is the use of a new set of characters in each act to tell the story, although the action is continuous. Three different settings are required for the play and special music, sound effects and lighting will be correlated with the acts.

The cast consists of four persons. The part of "Victor" is played by John Timmis, senior in arts from Warren; and the part of "Mordeen" is played by Mary Minkewich, graduate student in theatre arts from Uniondale, N.Y. "Joe Saul" is played by Charles Antalosky, junior in arts and letters from St. Clair and "Friend Ed" is portrayed by Floyd Santoro, junior in arts from Johnstown.
