The University Christian Association and denominational foundations will sponsor a Universal Day of Prayer service at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow in the Faith United Church of Christ.

The Rev. Theodore Braun, recently appointed chaplain to the University for the church, will preach at the service.

Yale Prof To Speak At Chapel

Dr. Roland H. Bampton, Titus Street professor of ecclesiastical history at the Divinity School and Associate Fellow of Jonathon Edwards College at Yale University, will speak at Chapel services at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

Dr. Bampton's subject is "The Jewish-Christian Heritage."

Members of the Jewish and Christian traditions will worship together on this occasion in observance of National Brotherhood Week.

Participating in the service will be Rabbi Benjamin Kahn, Jewish chaplain to the University, and Dr. Luther H. Harshbarger, University chaplain and coordinator of religious affairs. A combined choir under the direction of Willa Taylor, will lead in the musical responses and hymns of the Jewish and Christian services constituting the order of worship. George E. Ceiga, organist, will play selections from Felix Mendelssohn's "Sixth Sonata."

Dr. Bampton has been a member of the Yale faculty since 1919. He has won world-wide recognition as a specialist in Reformation history.

He will present the first of a series of dinner-lectures under the sponsorship of the University Christian association at 6 p.m. tonight in Dining Room A, Hetzel Union Building.

Miss Genevieve Dilts, associate director of the University Christian Association, will speak at the Protestant service of worship at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel.

Membership Of Senate Hiked to 242

The membership of the University Senate will change from 198 to 242 members as the result of changes made in the constitution of the Senate.

The changes were approved initially by the Senate and upon the recommendation of the Senate were then approved by the Board of Trustees.

The revision reportedly was made to reflect recent changes in the number and titles of administrative officers and to increase from nine to twelve the number of elected, as distinguished from ex-officio, members of the Senate from each College and the Graduate School.

Under the provisions of the change, the Senate, which will have 120 elected members and 122 ex-officio members, will consist of the following:

The president of the University, vice presidents of the University, deans of the several colleges and the Graduate School, dean of men, dean of women, director of the health center, librarian, dean of admissions and registrar (secretary), controller, director of general extension, special assistant to the president for student affairs.

Directors of extension, directors of research, and the associate and assistant deans in each of the colleges and the Graduate School, dean of summer sessions, director of the Division of Counseling, heads (or acting heads) of schools, divisions, and departments of resident instruction, and 12 representatives elected by ballot by each college and the Graduate School for a period of three years, four being elected each year.

In case the head of a department is also the dean of a college, that department shall have a representative in addition to the dean.

The Senate on Feb. 6 voted to put the revised amendment into effect immediately so that each college and the Graduate School will elect the increased number of senators when elections are held prior to May.

TV Enrollment Hits New High: 5,039

Student enrollment in the two closed circuit television systems transmitting from Sparks and Boucke buildings has hit a new peak of 5039, roughly one third of total enrollment for the Spring semester.

Fifteen different subjects are being offered in 19 classes for a total of 42 hours of classes, according to Leslie P. Greenhill, assistant director of the division of academic research and services.

In addition, professional training in techniques of television speaking, acting and writing is being offered in four classes in speech, theatre arts and journalism.

Certain courses in mathematics, zoology and military science are being televised for the first time this semester.

One class, Sociology I, conducted by Dr. William G. Mather, professor and head of the Department of Sociology, is being telecast simultaneously over station WFBG-TV, Altoona. Scheduled for 9 a.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday, it is the first University class given over closed circuit and outside T.V. at the same time.

The closed circuit system which began operating this semester from Boucke can supplement the existing system in Sparks or broadcast independently. At present 16 rooms are in use in Boucke and 15 in Sparks.

Television is also being put to use in sophomore chemistry labs to instruct students in the use of laboratory equipment. To date about 120 students have been taught via T.V. how to operate the analytical balance, a precise weighing machine.

A technique begun last year is being continued in metallurgy classes, whereby a camera is attached to the metallurgical microscope and the images projected on the screen.

Closed circuit T.V. classes began in the spring of 1955 under a grant from the Fund for the Advancement of Education.

WH Council to Sponsor 'Cupid's Nest' Dance

Course Adding Deadline Set At Noon Today

The deadline for adding courses is noon today.

The deadline for dropping courses is noon March 1.

To drop or add a course a student must fill out a drop-add form which he gets from his advisor. The form requires the same information as the number 2 card used in registration.

If dropping a course, a student then gets his class cards from the instructor whose course he is dropping. If also adding a course he gets the class card from the department in which the course is given.

The student then takes the class cards and the drop-add form to the registrar's office in the basement of Willard to pay the \$2 fee. The fee is waived if the drop-add is required by the department and not done because the student wants to change a course. To have the fee waived the drop-add form must be signed by the head of the department in which the student is enrolled.
