

IFC Kills Motion for Greeks To Submit Plan of Hell Week

The Interfraternity Council has defeated a motion to require all fraternities to submit a brief plan of their Hell Week to the dean of men's office, fraternity affairs office and the IFC Board of Control.

The motion, which was defeated unanimously Monday, was introduced by George

Wills, Board of Control chairman.

Wills proposed that each fraternity submit the approximate date of its Hell Week and a brief program of the week's activities on a standardized form.

The proposed form was to be signed by the house president with a vow to "live up to the underlying principles and spirit" of the IFC pre-initiation code.

Several suggestions were made to limit distribution of the signed form to the Board of Control or the dean of men's office on the grounds that the information should be kept as confidential as possible.

However, after several negative comments on the plan, it was defeated by a unanimous voice vote.

The council voted to establish a pledge scholarship trophy to be presented each spring to the house with the best pledge average.

The plan was introduced by James Hammerle, chairman of the IFC scholarship committee. The trophy will be a permanent award, not rotating. It will be presented each year at the annual Outstanding Pledge Banquet during Greek Week.

The winning pledge class will be determined by taking the average of all pledges having pledged at least 12 weeks in the spring semester or 12 weeks in the fall semester. The averages of both semesters will be included.

fence to get funds. The University can solicit and raise bond issues privately; the state legislature, although under no legal obligation, has a moral duty to give the University funds.

Even President Eric A. Walker implied during an interview recently that the University is in reality a state institution. "You know, last March we floated a bond issue for \$22 million (for new dormitories and dining rooms). We will pay off that bond issue from the rents and board fees we get from students. And 40 years from now the University—and this means the state—will own those dormitories . . ." Dr. Walker said.

The implication that any University property is also owned by the state is clearly put. Comparable situations of ownership are found at almost all other state universities.

This is how the University escaped the right-to-know laws passed by the state. By taking advantage of its Dr. Jekyll-Mr. Hyde standing, the Board of Trustees avoided the possibility of having to open its meetings to the public, even though the University President has strongly implied that the University is, in reality, a state institution.
