

# Ike, Nixon Construct Exec Emergency Plans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP)—President Eisenhower disclosed today that he and Vice President Nixon have a definite understanding of what Nixon will do in an emergency if the chief executive becomes unable to carry on his duties.

# McElroy Sees Defense Request

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Neil H. McElroy said today the administration soon will ask for another extra defense appropriation.

It may be as much as \$1,700,000,000. McElroy gave that information to the Senate Defense Preparedness subcommittee in a progress report on efforts to strengthen America in the space age.

He also said, in a discussion of missiles and space flight, that the Air Force and the Army are going to be shooting at the moon sometime and it probably will be earlier than later.

He further said that definite administration plans for reorganizing the Defense Department may be expected during March.

# Cuban Rebels Raid Bank, Spurn Cash

HAVANA, Feb. 26 (AP)—Cuban rebels boldly raided the Batista government's National Bank of Cuba today in their campaign to ridicule the regime during the national sports festival.

Striking boldly in downtown Havana, the raiders spurned cash. But pouches containing thousands of checks went up in flames. That will mean a long-time headache for government agencies and the business community.

The rebel band escaped cleanly after completing this effort to shame the Batista regime.

Eisenhower kept terms of the agreement a secret. But obviously it would embrace some arrangement for the vice president to shoulder at least part of the presidential responsibilities.

On other major points, Eisenhower told a news conference:

1. A tax cut is "a possibility if there is any deepening of the depression that requires it."

But more jobs may open up in March and "mark the beginning of the end of this recession." And with the government asking record sums for such things as public works, agriculture and peacetime defense, "you have got to try to get some money in your purse to pay for bills." So, "certainly you don't want to go into a tax cut until that is necessary to bring about the upturn."

2. Secretary of Agriculture Benson, target of resignation demands from some Republican House members from the farm belt, is a man of dedication, courage and intellectual and personal honesty. Those who are advising he be fired, Eisenhower said, "are badly mistaken."

# Science for Pa. Kiddies Is Required

HARRISBURG, Feb. 26 (AP)—Science today became a required course of instruction for children attending Pennsylvania public schools from kindergarten to sixth grade.

The State Council of Education adopted the plan as part of an overall tightening of Pennsylvania school requirements.

Other recommendations of the conference, all unanimously adopted with some slight alterations, will:

Require high school students to take a minimum of three years of English; three years of social studies; one year of health and physical education; one year of science and one year of mathematics or a foreign language as an alternate.

# Rep. Demands Mack's Removal From FCC

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP)—A House investigator said today Richard A. Mack should resign or be removed from the Federal Communications Commission, but President Eisenhower declined to pass judgment on Mack at this stage.

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# 'Hog-Wild' Students Deny Hot Time in Hoghouse

RICHMOND, Ind., Feb. 26 (AP)—Two expelled Earlham College students pleaded innocent today to arson and malicious trespass charges.

Sheriff Edward Cordell said the students admitted they had been drinking, killed two hogs with African spears and injured several others.

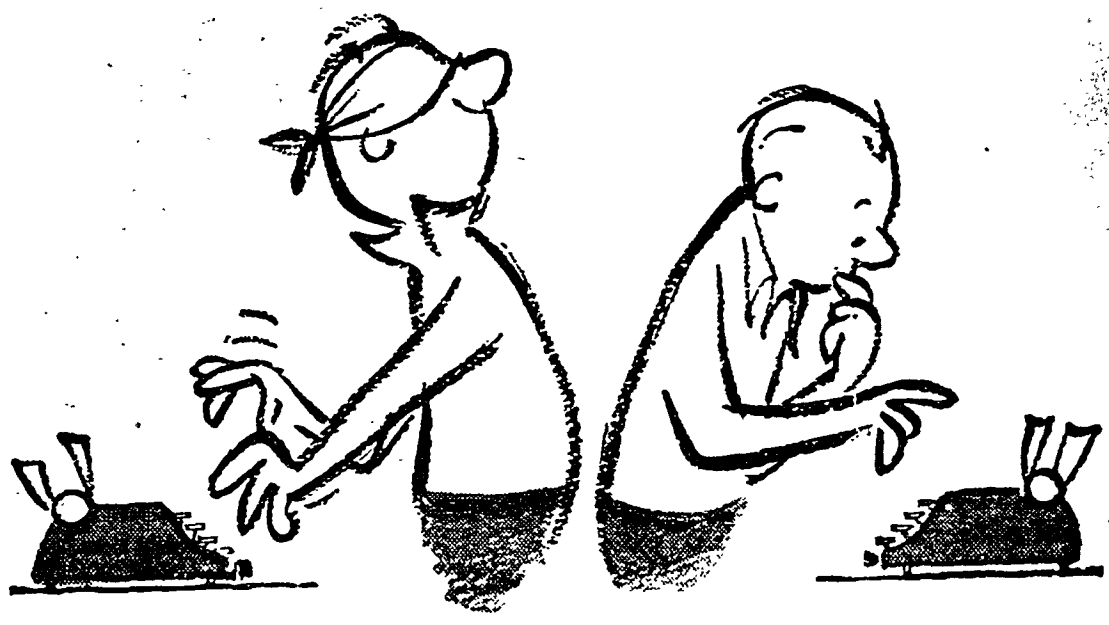
# Peaceful Plutonium Effort Is Launched

CHICAGO, Feb. 26 (AP)—The United States launched a 10-million-dollar effort today to convert the man-made atomic explosive plutonium to peacetime use as a fuel for nuclear power reactors.

The Atomic Energy Commission authorized its Argonne National Laboratory near Chicago to construct a fuels technology center where work will be speeded on the many problems involved.

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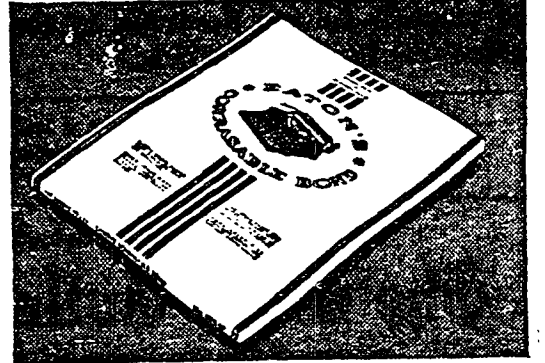
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
