

Club TIM Favored; Financial Aid Sought

The Town Independent Men Council will begin to seek financial support for its proposed Club TIM since a survey has showed that town independents are interested in the project.

Charles Bartholomew, chairman of the committee which conducted the survey announced that 80 per cent were interested in Club TIM and 65 per cent would be willing to contribute to its support.

Bartholomew said students who did not indicate a desire to support Club TIM would consider it if they saw what they would be paying for. The negative replies were reported to have come from men who are married or considering being married.

Financing Club TIM remains the biggest problem. TIM officials indicated they may seek aid from the University.

In other action at Wednesday's meeting, the council ratified an addition to the by-laws and heard a proposed amendment to the constitution and another addition to the by-laws.

The addition to the by-laws, if approved at the next meeting, would give all former TIM officers a seat on the council as long as they fulfill the requirements for office.

Education Council Requests Revamping of Curriculum

The Education Student Council has recommended that some education courses be dropped or consolidated and liberal arts courses added to the curriculum.

The council also felt that a proposed Honor System, although a fine idea, would be unworkable because of the size of the University. Council members said the time for the instigation of such a program was long past.

Some council members said such courses as Education I should be consolidated into the education blocks as a practical course. Others felt that it could be divided into two parts, the first of which could be included in the first semester's program and the other in the seventh or eighth semester.

Because of the increased emphasis being placed on math and science the council members have suggested that such liberal arts

courses as Math 6, Zoology 25 as well as similar courses should be added to the education curriculums.

Council felt that the advisory system should be re-organized so that advisors would be able to spend more time with their advisees.
