"If we're going to have anything, it will be now," he said. No serious cases of flu are now being treated at the infirmary. Glenn said. Students are still showing up at the infirmary with German measles - seven cases were reported last week.

Glenn said the measles last for about three days. The current crop of cases is not unusual, he said. German measles have occurred like this among students for the past several years.
