

Cabinet Endorses Steele's Judgment

(Continued from page one) sure fund raising campaigns for phia, New York and Pittsburgh, Larry Sharp." Jacobson asked if these are expenses you can hardly avoid."

Steele said he feels "quite confident nothing wrong was done" in not submitting his expense account and left over money until two months after the trip was completed. He said Donovan and his staff "knew I had the money" and had not submitted any receipts but "everyone knew this had to be done sometime."

He said, "I just didn't take the time to do it." He said he submitted them directly on being questioned since "naturally the figures would now be necessary."

Concluding his report, Steele said: "I feel I have not betrayed my responsibilities to the students I represent."

Lawrence Jacobson, senior in journalism from Chester and staff member of The Daily Collegian, questioned Steele on telling Cabinet members last Thursday that the expenses had totaled \$150 when they were actually only \$126.17.

"This is about what I said," Steele answered. "I didn't have the figures running around in my head."

Dubbs told Cabinet Jacobson was speaking as a student and not as a representative of Collegian.

Jacobson said the extra day cost about \$50. He said train fare would have cost about \$22.00 for Steele and Yeager, about \$24.00 less than the \$46.80 spent for plane fare.

Jacobson also pointed out that taxis were probably used in "going somewhere on pleasure — not necessarily on business."

Jacobson questioned Steele on a letter to The Daily Collegian by Donovan and Joseph Boehret, All-University secretary-treasurer, saying the Collegian had done "incalculable damage to fu-

ture fund raising campaigns for phia, New York and Pittsburgh, Larry Sharp." Jacobson asked if these are expenses you can hardly avoid."

Boehret here interrupted to say that since Steele had not written the letter, he should not be asked to comment on it. Steele answered Jacobson's question, however, saying he "would not say the fund was irreparably damaged," but that it was "unfortunate that this re-issue will come to mind when the Sharp fund is mentioned in the future."

Jacobson then asked Steele why he had not included the \$22 he refunded to Cabinet Friday in the report.

James Hart, Interfraternity Council president, said the most important issue was the "insinuation" the Steele trip made on student government. He said Cabinet should go on record as condoning or disapproving Steele's actions, and that "we cannot crucify student government on an amount of anywhere from \$25 to \$50."

After Miss Jablonski voiced the motion for endorsement, Jacobson said Steele's actions were "merely a mistake" and that Cabinet "should not condone it or censure it."

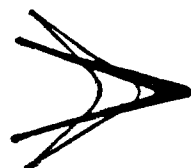
