University Architectural Pair Apply Design for Modern Life

Take a marriage, children and a profession, add "his and hers" drawing boards and you've got the blueprint for a successful husband and wife team—Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbert Salmon, parents, architects and professors.

They met over a T square as undergraduates in architecture at the University of Pennsylvania, got masters' degrees, went their separate ways and later wound up working for the same firm in Chicago.

There one rough sketch led to a full scale romance and in 1947 the architectural firm of Salmon and Salmon came to State College.

Their philosophy of family living and views on contemporary architecture are combined in their "Salmons built" two level home high on a hill near Spring Creek.

To borrow an expression from architect Frank Lloyd Wright, it is built not on a hill, but of the hill so that hill and house live together, each the happier for the other.

Settled in the living room, Salmon, reddish haired associate professor of architecture, and his wife, associate professor of housing and home art, explained their philosophy for modern living.

"We feel every house should be planned in terms of 'zones' of activity rather than just rooms and solid walls. A home is a place where a family grows aesthetically, spiritually and mentally."

The main areas of the Salmons' home center around sleeping, living-dining and working. The plan is like an "H" with one ear cut off and the kitchen as a cross bar. On the upper level are 3 bedrooms, a study and the living-dining area.

"We want the children to feel that it's their home as well as ours," Salmon said. "That's why our office is on the lower level with a separate outside entrance. We can entertain clients and work without cluttering up the living area."

The living room is cozy with colorful draperies. "We wanted to create a feeling of unlimited space," Salmon said. "During the day you can see all the way to the top of Mt. Nittany or north to the sun shining on Spring Creek through 'walls of glass.'"

Mrs. Salmon has firm notions about the place of a designing woman: "A woman's first concern is her family and I'll be the first to admit her place is in . . . She was interrupted by cries of "Mommy, we want a glass of water" from daughters Elizabeth 16, and Mary, 7.

The Salmons as a working team share a togetherness unknown to

many husbands and wives.

"We like working as a team," Salmon said. "If one of us says something professional, the other knows how to interpret it." "Sometimes," he grinned, "we interchange classroom responsibilities."

As for any disagreement, he shrugged, "everybody disagrees now and then over what should be done but if I have the time I do it."

The Salmons' house has several types of lighting, including pinhole spots in the living-dining area and a plastic blister type dome that brings the stars into the study.

The team has designed everything from "dream homes" in State College to the recently completed Pleasant Gap Church. Their specialty is rehabilitation centers for the physically handicapped and they serve as consultants for the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults.
