

# Debators Score 4-2, 5-5 in Tournaments

Members of the Men's debate team compiled a 4-2 record in the Boston University tournament and a 5-5 record at the North-South tournament at the University of West Virginia. The women's debate team had a 5-5 record in the Capitol Hill tournament at the University of Maryland.

Jay Feldstein and Gerald Bogus of the men's team debated both negative and affirmative in the Boston Tournament. They defeated Brandeis University, East Nazarene College, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and St. Anselm's College. They lost to Boston University and Tufts College.

In the North-South tournament the affirmative team of Herbert Cohen and Nathan Brenner had a 1-4 record. They defeated Washington and Lee College. They were beaten by Richmond College, Marietta College, William and Mary College and Waynesburg College.

The negative team of Byron La Van and Kermit Winkleblech defeated the University of West Virginia, Washington and Jefferson University and Concord University. They were defeated by Richmond College.

The affirmative women's team consisting of Sandra Grotzky and Carol Reed defeated Purdue University, Merchant Marine Academy, Ohio Wesleyan College and the University of Maryland. They lost to Bradley College.

Arlene D'Onofrio and Victoria O'Donnell of the negative team defeated Duke University. They lost to Dennison College, Dartmouth College, Northwestern University and Bates College.

All teams debated the national topic, "Resolved: that compulsory membership in a labor organization as a condition of employment should be made illegal."

## Recovery Turbine Given for Research

A power recovery turbine from a Curtis-Wright turbo-compound aircraft engine has been given to the University by the Curtis-Wright Corp., Wood Ridge, N.J., for use in research conducted under contract with the Office of Naval Research.

Paul Ebaugh, assistant dean for research in the College of Engineering and Architecture, said that the turbine, valued at approximately \$5500, will be used in the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

## Jackson Awarded Research Grant

Dr. Douglas N. Jackson, assistant professor of psychology, has been named co-investigator in a research grant for \$3352 awarded by the National Institute of Mental Health in the U.S. Public Health Service.

Titled "Some Relationships between Intellectual Abilities and Personality Organizations," the study is designed to investigate the extent to which personality factors can account for intellectual performances.

The Physical Education Student Council of the College of Physical Education and Athletics will sponsor a banquet for faculty and students in the spring.

The conference is called every 10 years by the President.

# 3 Profs' Children, 2 Others Hurt in Cap Blast

Three University professors' children and two other fourth grade members of the Nittany Avenue School escaped serious injury Monday when a dynamite cap exploded in their classroom. Dennis Klaus, son of Erwin Klaus, associate research professor of petroleum chemistry, detonated the cap in the room after he found it on the way to school. The boy connected two wires of the cap to a dry cell which was in

the room for demonstration purposes. Klaus is listed in "satisfactory condition" in the Centre County Hospital, Bellefonte, with multiple injuries to the right side of his body. The four other students received less serious injuries from the flying shrapnel. They were Arthur Lewis Jr., son of Arthur

O. Lewis, associate professor of English literature; Susan Rigley, daughter of Col. O. H. Rigley, professor of air science; Cheryl Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry B. Taylor; and Frances Wallace, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Wallace, all of State College.
