16 Schools Attend Debate Congress

The men's and women's debate teams are hosting 16 colleges and universities at the 23rd annual Interstate Debate Congress which began yesterday morning and will end today.

The congress will be conducted in the manner of the Senate of the United States and will prepare two model bills. The proposed bills are:

- Should the requirement of membership in a labor organization as a condition of employment be made illegal?

How can our colleges and universities best meet the increasing demand for higher education? The "Higher Education" bill will be discussed at 9 a.m. today.

The final prepared bills will be presented to the Congress of the United States at the close of the session.

The congress is designed to give the participants practice in parliamentary speaking and procedure. They will participate in formulating committees and make speeches defending their positions.

The bills were prepared at meetings yesterday morning and afternoon.

The "Right to Work" bill was discussed last night.

Students should be able to produce identification, preferably permanent matriculation cards, Fishburn said. The party cards are non-transferable, and last semester's are no longer valid.

To be elected a party's candidate for office, a nominee must receive a majority of the total votes cast for the office. All candidates must have a minimum 2.4 All-University average. No student may be nominated in both parties, according to the Elections Code.

Candidates for junior class officers must be fourth semester, and those for senior offices must be sixth semester. All-University office candidates also must be sixth semester students. Parties must submit candidates for all nine offices to be filled in the spring elections, March 25, 26, and 27.

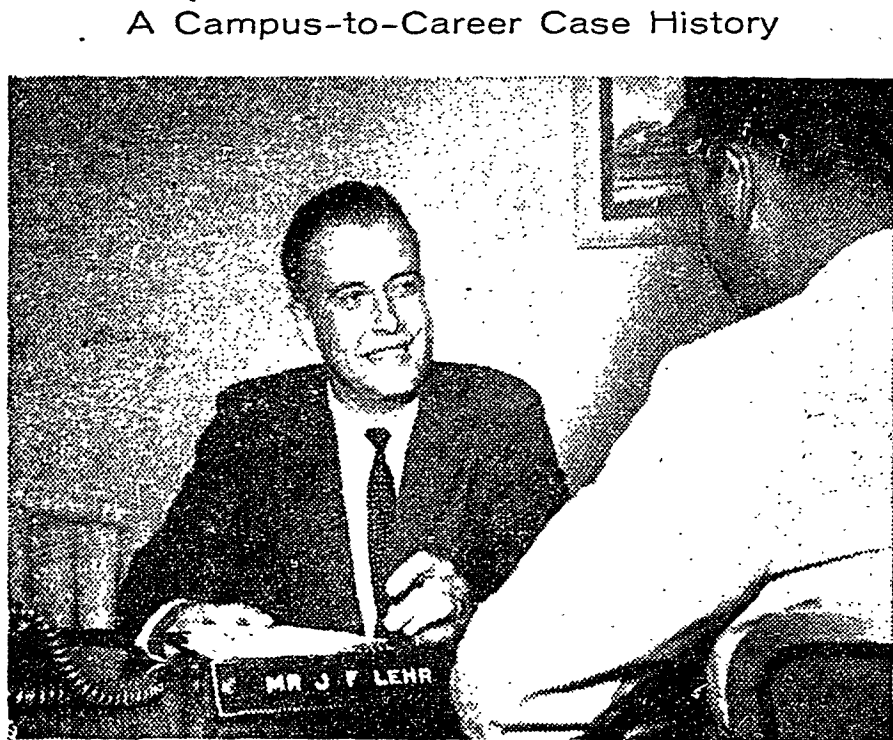
