

Freshman Suspended By Senate

A freshman involved in both the possession of alcoholic beverages on University property and the possession of a car has been given a deferred suspension for the rest of the semester by the Senate Subcommittee on Disciplinary Action.

Another student involved in the same case was put on office probation for the rest of the semester, and a letter will be sent to his parents according to decision by the Association of Independent Men Judicial Board of Review.

The decisions were based on a campus patrol report stating that patrolmen confiscated a gallon jug containing alcoholic beverages from the first student's car in parking area 23. When questioned, the second student refused to admit he was a University student at first, but then told the board he realized "he could not get away with it."

The first student said he brought the car up for spring semester but had kept it at his grandmother's home until the weekend in question.

The Senate committee based the decision on the University rules prohibiting freshmen from having cars in Centre County and prohibiting the possession or use of alcoholic beverages on the campus.

A deferred suspension is a suspension that is suspended, but will go into effect immediately upon any other bad conduct by the student.

Simes to Watch Naval Exercise

Dean of Men Frank J. Simes will leave today for Norfolk, Va., to serve as a civilian observer on an amphibious exercise involving more than 40,000 sailors and marines, 60 ships, and 260 aircraft of the Atlantic Fleet.

He will embark on the USS Valley Forge for the exercise, which begins tomorrow. He will return March 25. The exercise includes a full scale amphibious assault against North Carolina beaches.

Captain Victor B. McCrea, former professor of naval science at the University, will command a fast transport group of cruisers, amphibious ships, and support carriers.

McCrea, who maintains his residence in State College, is now commander of Transport Amphibious Squadron Six, based at Norfolk.

IRC to Discuss Plans for Trip

An orientation meeting for students interested in participating in the International Relations Club's field trip to Washington will be held at 7 tonight in 100 Sparks.

The trip, to be taken March 30 to April 2 is under the auspices of the national organization and is open to all club members and interested students.

The program includes a model policy planning staff in which each attending college will choose a Middle East nation and attempt to solve some of the problems facing the State Department in our foreign relations with that country.

Cows' Production Continues; Creamery Left With Surplus

The University is said to receive a good part of the food surplus of Pennsylvania, but during Thanksgiving, Christmas, semester and Easter vacations a surplus is created which must be shipped to other parts of the state.

Because the cows can't be "turned off," the University Creamery must turn surplus milk into cheese or ship the milk to competing dairies in the vicinity.

The University Creamery, operated by the Dairy Department, was built in 1932 as a laboratory for teaching and research purposes. The building is divided into five units, each unit representing a complete plant for the handling of a dairy product.

The units are devoted to the manufacture of butter, ice cream, condensed milk, and milk powder. The creamery is so arranged that milk received at the receiving room may be pumped to the various departments needing these products.

The creamery began selling its products to the University, as a sideline, because it was best equipped to provide this service. It now buys about 700,000 pounds of milk a month from 21 farmers in the State College area.

A total of 5000 to 6000 quarts of milk are sent daily to the residence hall dining rooms and 1200 to 1500 are sold on daily retail routes. Milk and chocolate-covered ice cream bars are sold through vending machines in the dormitories. Ice cream and soft ice cream are sold not only at the creamery store but also at the Fetzels Union Building.

Cheddar cheese, cream cheese, spreads, cottage cheese and bleu cheese are sold at the creamery's cheese retail store.

The creamery is self-sustaining and receives no funds from the University. And, like any other dairy, it is under state supervision with regard to sanitation and milk pricing.

Although the creamery employs 27 full-time workers, some students are employed on an hourly basis. When students are having classes in the creamery, they act as plant men during that time and manufacture the products just as the regular force does.

Attached to the creamery is a wing which contains offices, class rooms and laboratories. Here the students are taught how to manufacture products and begin experimenting on new products.

From November to February, short courses are taught. These are one- or two-week courses in milk tank weighing and sampling, making soft ice cream, testing dairy products and processing milk.

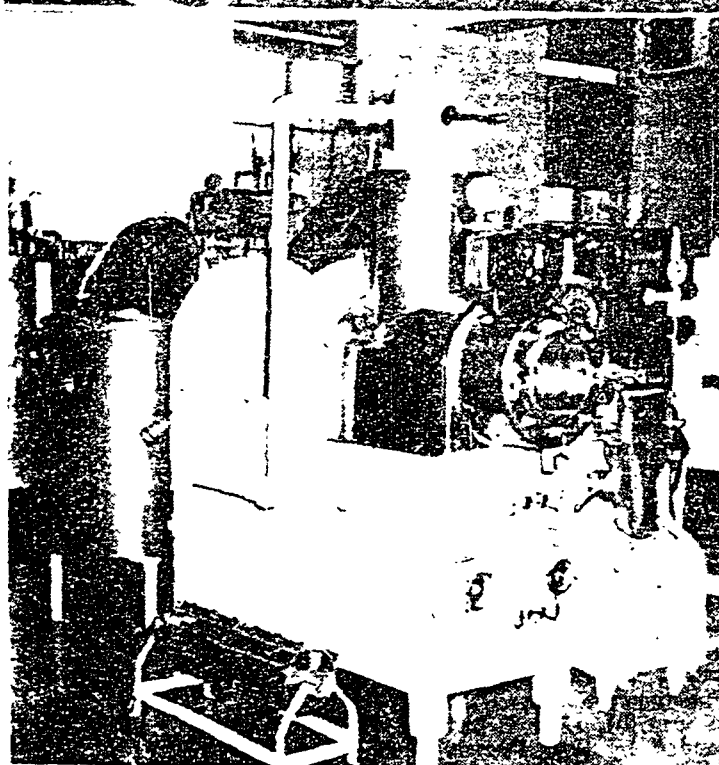
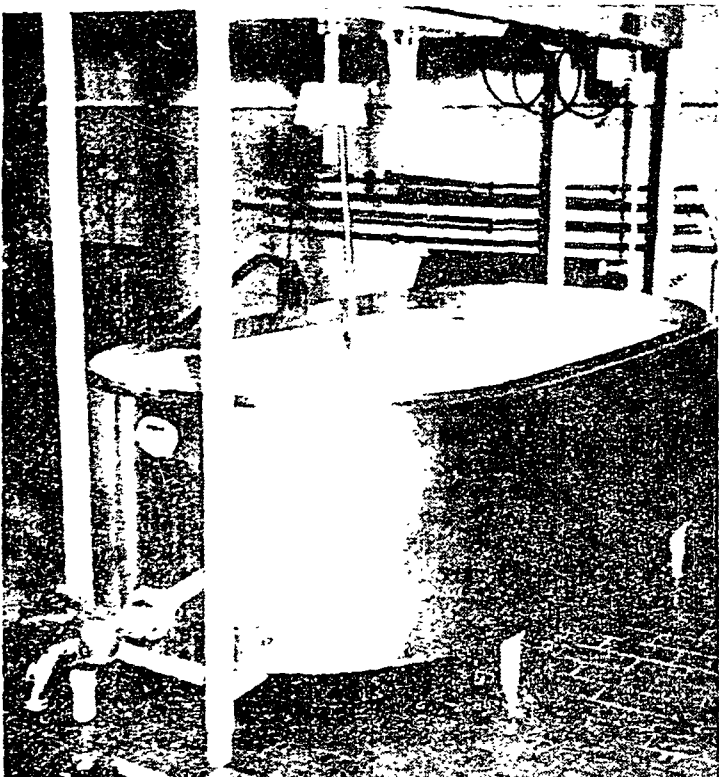
Kiwanis to Present Japan Travel Film

The council also voted not to have a Spring Week booth.

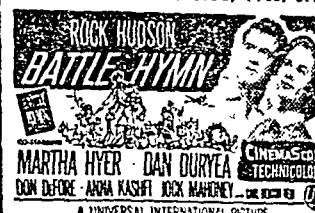
