

Triangle Pledges Hold Top Average

Triangle fraternity, whose pledge average for the last two semesters was 2.97, last night received the Pledge Scholarship Trophy at the Outstanding Pledge Banquet in the Hetzel Union Building.

Ossian R. MacKenzie, dean of the College of Business Administration and vice president of business administration, spoke on Greek ideals to the outstanding fraternity and sorority pledges.

The trophy was created this year by the Interfraternity Council to be awarded each spring to the fraternity with the best pledge average for the previous spring and fall semester.

MacKenzie told the pledges what should be expected of them in their respective groups.

After polling his audience, MacKenzie summed up the answer saying that Greeks should set their own ideals and be ready and willing to work for them.

MacKenzie listed the main contributions a Greek should make to his fraternity or sorority as scholarship, friendship, citizenship, loyalty and a firm spiritual belief. He said that among these, a strong spiritual belief should be the top contribution.

Concerning citizenship, MacKenzie said this means participating locally in such groups as the Parent-Teachers Association, Rotary Clubs and other service clubs. He pointed out that in a totalitarian regime, these are absent and we should "hold on and prize them."

MacKenzie also stressed loyalty, saying that once we learn to be loyal we will "hang on" to it devoting ourselves to fraternity, institution and country.

Richard Christian, of Pi Kappa Alpha, served as master of ceremonies. He entertained during the dinner with ventriloquism.
