1261 Persons Register For Home Ec Weekend

A total of 1261 persons registered for the first day of the ninth annual Home Economics Spring Weekend as of 5 p.m. yesterday.

The meetings, exhibits, lectures, panels and discussions will continue until 5 p.m. today. Officials of the College of Home Economics estimated that approximately the same number of persons will register tomorrow, bringing the total attendance to over 2000 persons.

Israeli Attache Will Discuss Cultural Image

Dr. Mordecai Levy, cultural attache of the Israel Consulate in New York, will discuss "The Evolving Cultural Image of Israel" at 8 p.m. Monday in the Hillel auditorium.

In memory of the foundation of the 10th anniversary of the state of Israel, Hillel is sponsoring three lectures, beginning Monday. Dr. Raphael Patai, director of research of the Theodor Herzl Institute, will speak April 30 on "Israel Between East and West: Problems of Human Relations."

This week's speaker, Dr. Levy, first came to the United States in 1952 on a State Department Leadership Grant. He returned in 1957 as an Eisenhower Exchange Scholar.

After the lecture, Alpha Epsilon Phi will sponsor a reception in the Hillel lounge.

The public may attend both the lecture and reception.

Blind Bass Player Emcees Radio Show

Being bass player in a jazz combo, radio show M-C, fraternity rushing chairman, IFCPA senior board member, and holder of a 2.2 All-University average is an accomplishment for anyone, but even more of one for Robert Waterstradt, junior in psychology from Hatboro—who is blind.

You might have heard Bob some Thursday night over radio station WDFM. He has his own modern jazz show there, which he calls "Contemporary Concepts."

"One night when I was still a freshman," Bob said, "I was up at the radio station to hear a tape of our quartet. I happened to ask if WDFM had any show for contemporary jazz. The station manager asked if I'd like to do one, and had me audition. Before long I had my own 15-minute show."

In seven weeks Bob's show had grown to an hour a week, and it has remained so for the past two years. It can be heard Thursdays between 7 and 8 p.m. This is a vocation Bob hopes will continue throughout his life.

Music seems to play a major part in Bob's life for he spends his Wednesday and Saturday nights playing with the Don Krebs Quartet, also known as the Frank Telesca-Combo. Bob plays the bass fiddle.

"Making hi-fidelity recordings is my hobby," Bob said. "It started when I used to record weddings as a part-time job when I was in high school."

Now he is continuing in this line for his own enjoyment.

"My goal is to obtain a complete collection of campus talent," Bob explained. Working toward this goal he has made recordings of the Blue Band, his own quartet, the Phi Mu Alpha band, the University Symphony Orchestra

and the Penn State Choral Society.

In addition to all this Bob finds time to act as rushing chairman for his fraternity, Alpha Kappa Lambda, and as one of five senior board members of the Inter-Fraternity Council Purchasing Association.

Bob says that in order to study, all his texts must be read to him. "I especially appreciate the help that the girls of two sororities have given me," he said.

He figures, however, that it takes him twice as long to study a page, having it read to him, as it would take could he read it himself. His exams are either typewritten or taken orally.

Bob is majoring in rehabilitation counseling and hopes to help other people who are handicapped.

Members of the Home Economics Student Council will participate in a panel discussion with Robert Steele, former All-University president, on the college's place in All-University government. The panel will be presented at 1 p.m. today in the Hetzel Union cardroom.
