

Reilly Stars As Golfers Down West Point, 5-2

Captain Pat Reilly posted a sensational two under-par 71 to lead the Penn State golf team to its second consecutive victory of the season Saturday, as the Lions downed Army, 5-2, at West Point.

Reilly combined a 38 out and 33 in for his score. He birdied the 8th, 9th, 11th, 12th and 13th holes in his, 5 and 4, win over Army's Bill Parks. The 33 on the back nine was three under-par for the tricky West Point golf course.

Number two man Bill Davidson played his usual top-notch game in rapping West Point's Randy Edlestein, 4 and 2. Davidson's excellent chipping and putting was credited for his second straight win.

John Felus battled down to the wire before dropping a 1-up sudden-death thriller to Dick Groves. The 22-hole match was completed as darkness fell over the course.

Bob Bainbridge, who parred 11 holes and bogied twice, upped the Lion lead to 3-1, pounding out an easy 7 and 5 decision over Art Mace.

The Black Knights' John Soper barely edged Penn State's Charlie Decker, 1-up, for the second Army point.

However, the Lions' Roy Altman kept the team in front with a trouble free, 4 and 3, victory over Cadet John Abernathy.

In the final match, Scott Stultz registered his second straight triumph of the season as he trimmed Harry White, 1-up.

Coach Joe Boyle, in summing up his club's showing, said: "Even though Army's greens are fast and tricky and require local knowledge, our boys certainly played well."

The Military Academy was looking for its second win of the season after beating Manhattan, 7-0, in its opener last week. The Nittany Lions walloped the Lehigh linksmen, 7-0.

The Lions go into action again tomorrow when they face the University of Pennsylvania and Villanova teams in a triangular match at Norristown. They will be trying to duplicate their performance of last season when they copped 7-0 victories over both the Quakers and Wildcats.

Maryland's Jackson Yang beat Penn State's Fred Trust in the number one tennis match, 6-3, 6-4, Saturday to launch his team on the road to a 6-3 victory over the Lions at the Beaver Field courts.

Chuck Questa and Mel Royer, number three and six men respectively, scored the only two singles wins for the Lions and Royer teamed with Dick Jacobs to register the only doubles win.

Yang, a pint-sized Chinese-American, completely outclassed the Lion captain in his 6-3 first set win. Yang combined fine headwork, fast footwork and a smooth backhand in an exhibition of tennis finesse to give a crowd-pleasing performance.

The Maryland captain jumped into a quick 3-1 second set lead, but before long Trust was ahead, 4-3, by virtue of his strong serve and forehand. Just as it seemed Trust was going to completely overpower his opponent, Yang regained his form with some well-placed shots, copping three straight games to sew up the match. The partisan Penn State fans then gave the little Terrapin a big round of applause.

Charlie Bibleheimer lost to Carl Bucks, 5-7-3-5. Gene Flick lost to undefeated Tom Beal.

DETROIT (AP)—Mickey McDermott lined a pinch single to center field in his first appearance with the Detroit Tigers Monday and gave them a 2-1 triumph over the Chicago White Sox.

The lean southpaw, who has not seen action as a pitcher, greeted reliever Ray Moore with a line smash that scored pinch runner Johnny Groth from the second base. Groth was running for Charlie Maxwell, whose double leading off dictated the removal of starter Dick Donovan.

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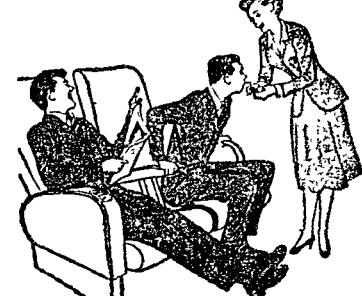


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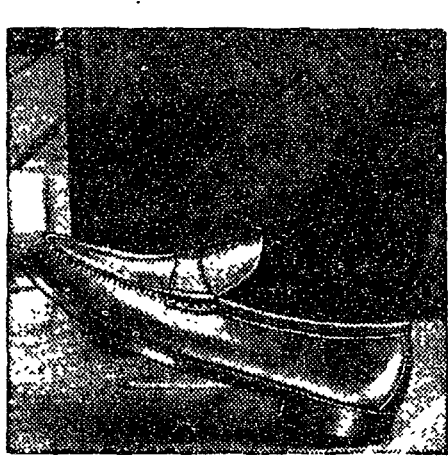
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
