(Continued from page one) later, she was asked to lecture on her experiences and on religion. Dr. Charles E. Raven was called from Cambridge to talk with her on a television program. Her association with Dr. Raven became permanent when she married him a short time later, she said.

Since then, she said, they have worked as a team in their lecturing work. Mrs. Raven is author of the "The Pain of Life," a French book dealing with human rights and the "intellectual exiles." She is writing another book now concerning her war experience.

Dr. Albert Schweitzer and Yehudi Menuhin, personal friends of Mrs. Raven's, have taken a great interest in her work with refugees, she said.




