

Kremlin Cooperation Bid Refused by Yugoslavs

LJUBLJANA, Yugoslavia (AP)—President Marshal Tito's chief lieutenant curtly informed the Kremlin that Yugoslav Communists refuse to trade their independence for Soviet cooperation.

One of Tito's top theoreticians, Vice president Edward Kardelj, suggested tartly that the Russians themselves might be the ones guilty of distorting Leninism—not the Yugoslavs.

Air Force Quits Search For 'Mystery Nose'

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The Air Force yesterday called off its attempt to recover the mystery nose cone of the first U.S. ballistic missile to be fired thousands of miles.

Meanwhile, the Navy worked here to prepare for launching the last of its Vanguard satellite test vehicles, this one containing for the first time a 20-inch, 21.5-pound sphere.

The Navy launching schedule is secret. The test series, initially not designed to carry satellites, will be followed by some seven regular Vanguard satellite launches.

In a one-sentence news release, the Air Force here said it "confirmed reports that efforts to recover the nose cone of the Thor-Able missile launched last night—Wednesday—from Cape Canaveral have been discontinued."

The failure of a telemetry device aboard the second stage was said unofficially to have frustrated the all-important recovery attempt.

Lack of Arms Causes Cuban Exiles to Disband

HAVANA (AP)—Exiles who landed in western Cuba to attempt opening a new front in Fidel Castro's revolt are reported disbanding for lack of arms and ammunition.

Dispatches from eastern Cuba, where Castro's revolt has been centered for the past 17 months, said 42 rebels had given up and 12 were killed in the past 48 hours.

Ike's Proposals On Labor Laws Go to Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—The administration yesterday threw President Eisenhower's labor law proposals into an already boiling Senate debate over union corruption curbs and other restraints.

The move promised a battle running for several days over a wide gamut of proposed labor law changes.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, sought to confine consideration to the single bill before the Senate—a plan to regulate labor welfare funds.

Sen. William Knowland of California pushed a series of amendments he described as labor's bill of rights but classed by Johnson as anti-labor. Knowland said he was opposed by a coalition of Democrats and AFL-CIO leaders.

Eisenhower's package plan calls for filing full reports with the government on all union funds as well as welfare funds. Penalties would be provided for fraud or false statements. Violating unions could lose their tax-exempt status.

Israel Has 10th Anniversary; Jordan Forces Watch Line

JERUSALEM, Israeli Sector (AP)—Israel flexed its military muscles in a 10th anniversary parade yesterday while Jordanian forces watchfully manned stations along the line that still divides the city into hostile camps.

Israeli leaders and about 300,000 spectators saw this nation's armed forces pass in review without incident. The parade was boycotted by almost all foreign diplomats.

It took place over the protest of the UN Mixed Armistice Commission, which declared Wednesday that the concentration of Is-

raeli forces in Jerusalem violated the 1949 armistice agreement. Israel contended there was no violation because the troops would be withdrawn from the city immediately after the celebration.

President Izbak Ben-Zvi, Premier David Ben-Gurion, the Israeli Cabinet and some foreign guests received the salutes as the parading forces passed along a route jammed with spectators who had begun gathering soon after daybreak. Hundreds of thousands more Israelis listened to a radio description of the parade and Ben-Gurion's message.

Waterfront Damages Seen at Several Million

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. (AP)—A raging waterfront fire destroyed millions of gallons of petroleum products at the Deepwater terminal of the Esso Standard Oil Co. yesterday.

Triggered by an explosion in the steam-generating plant shortly before 11 p.m. Wednesday, the inferno destroyed 12 of the terminal's 21 storage tanks and damaged several others.

June Draft Call

HARRISBURG (AP)—State selective service headquarters yesterday fixed Pennsylvania's June draft call at 688 men. All must be at least 22 years of age.

Kremlin-line observers at the 10th Yugoslav Communist party congress listened in stony silence while the delegates cheered.

The Communist bloc observers were back in their seats after a walkout Wednesday during another bristling speech by another Tito lieutenant, Vice President Alexander Rankovic.

Kardelj, No. 2 man in the Yugoslav regime after Tito, Thursday continued the determined counterattack on Moscow keynoted earlier by Tito.

He appealed to the congress to adopt a draft program which was the source of the Kremlin's anguish and detonated the new Belgrade-Moscow crisis. The Muscovites insist the program revises Marxism-Leninism as interpreted by the Kremlin.

Kardelj's speech indicated Kremlin-Tito relations are back where they were in 1954, when the two started a reconciliation attempt.
