

Tennis Team in Crucial Week

Netters at Penn In Crucial Tilt

The first tennis match of a crucial three-match week was rained out yesterday at Bucknell. So the Lion net team, still smarting from its defeat at Colgate Saturday, goes to Philadelphia today to battle the Quakers of Penn.

Lion net coach Sherm Fogg called this week the one

that could make or break the Nittanians in regard to a successful or unsuccessful season because of the three matches, two of which had to be won to blaze the trail of success.

The third match is on Saturday at the Beaver Field court against perennially powerful Lehigh.

In preparation for the time of crisis, Fogg gave a rehashing of the Colgate defeat and expressed satisfaction at what he called "the first time in a while that the boys have given close attention to the lecture."

He showed the team how it lost three or four matches through carelessness, and feels the boys lost the "conceit" that they acquired after shutting out Juniata last week. He hopes the new attitude will be an aid in the week's battles.

The Quakers' hopes for an excellent season, based on the return of the top six lettermen, were thwarted by the loss of last year's number one man John Mangan and the continued ill health of Bob Robbins, the present squad's number two player, who has a chronic back condition.

Mangan has secured a leave of absence to play year-round in California. In musing over his prospective competition earlier in the year, Lion coach Sherm Fogg had called Mangan the third best in Pennsylvania—the first two, Bill Scarlett and Lowell Latschan, will be here on Saturday.

To date the Quakers are win-starved, having lost four straight to Swarthmore (5-4), Brown (6-3), Harvard (9-10), Dartmouth (6-3). Three year varsity performer Ralph Levitan, captain for the second year, is playing number one. He played in the second spot on last year's team that fell to the Lions, 8-1.

Levitan is one of the biggest netmen playing in the East—six feet two, 200 pounds.

The remainder of the Quakers' top six are Robbins, Howard Friedel, Jerry Finerman, Claude Beer, and Gray Perkins.

The first two doubles teams are Levitan and Finerman, Rob-

bins and Friedel. The third duo changes periodically. The number two team went undefeated last year in ten matches.

Penn State will probably go with the same players announced by Fogg for yesterday's washout.

That will be Captain Fred Trust, Charlie Bibleheimer, Chuck Questa, Gene Flick, Dick Jacobs and Mel Royer in the singles department; Trust and Questa, Flick and Bibleheimer and Royer and Jacobs in the doubles.

The Quakers are always to be reckoned with because of consistent winning seasons. Under the dean of the Penn coaching staff, Wallace Johnson, the team has had only six losing seasons in the net mentor's previous 28 at the helm.

Penn has one other aid on its side in its match with the Lions besides season after season consistency—that is Fate's trustful helper, the law of averages. Penn has never beaten State in 16 other outings.

Philly's HR Sparks Phils 7-4 Win in S.F.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Veteran outfielder Dave Philley blasted a 370-foot home run in the fifth inning Tuesday and sent Philadelphia's Phillies on to a 7-4 victory that knocked the San Francisco Giants out of first place in the National League.

A crowd of 6801, smallest of the season, turned out for the game.

Philley's blast, his third hit of the game, started the Phils on a four-run inning that brought the first pitching victory of the season to left hander Curt Simmons.

The setback left San Francisco a half game behind the world champion Milwaukee Braves, who defeated the Chicago Cubs 8-4. It also snapped the two-game victory string of Venezuelan right hander Ramont Monzant who was charged with five runs and the defeat.

Emery Seeks 6th Straight Win In Baseball Tilt at Navy Today

Southpaw ace Cal Emery will be seeking his sixth straight win this afternoon when Penn State's baseball team tangles with Navy at Annapolis.

The undefeated Lion star hasn't started a game since he whipped Bucknell, 11-0, last Thursday. But he did see two innings of relief duty in the second game of a twin-bill with Syracuse Saturday, and that was enough time for him to earn his fifth win of the year.

Although the towering lefty has an impressive five game record, which includes a phe-

nominal .067 earned run average and 43 strikeouts, he is just beginning to round into his top form. Against Bucknell last week, Emery gave up only two scratch singles, and two walks in a six inning hurling stint; and in his two inning relief role against Syracuse, he limited the Orange to a bunt single while fanning five.

In 29 1/3 innings, all told, Emery has allowed seven runs—only two of which were earned—15 hits and 18 walks.

Emery's mound opponent this afternoon will probably be Navy's Captain Ben Montoya. Montoya, who fills the right field position when not on the hill, owns three victories to date, including an 8-5 decision over Brown last Thurs-

day. Montoya is a righthander, and because of that Lion Coach Joe Bedenk will use his "southpaw outfield platoon" in his starting array. That will find three-year vet Jack McMullen in right field and junior Chuck Caldwell in center. McMullen, who hit a three-run homer against Syracuse, is currently batting .333 while Caldwell is hitting at a .455 clip.

If Navy uses a portside flinger, then veteran Dave Watkins (.182) will replace McMullen and senior rookie Joe Moore (.188) will be in for Caldwell.

Ron Rainey is the "other" man in the outfield, but he is seen in his left field spot regardless of the pitcher. Rainey, a lefthand swinger with a .333 batting average, leads the team in runs-batted-in with 12.

The rest of Penn State's lineup is standard: Gary Miller (.500) at first, Fegley (.387) at second, Bob Hoover (.281) at short, Steve Baidy (.185) at third, and Captain Don Stickler (.259) behind the plate.

"I don't know what Navy has this year," Bedenk said before departing for Annapolis last night, "but they usually field a good team."

"And they're always tough on their own field," Assistant Coach Chuck Medlar added.

The Lions beat the Middies at Annapolis last year, 8-5, but had to go 11 innings to do it. Ed Drapcho was the winning hurler and Jim Lockerman the batting star (for the Lions) with three hits. Both have since graduated, however.

Following today's tilt, the Lions return home for games with once-beaten Gettysburg, Friday and West Virginia, Saturday.

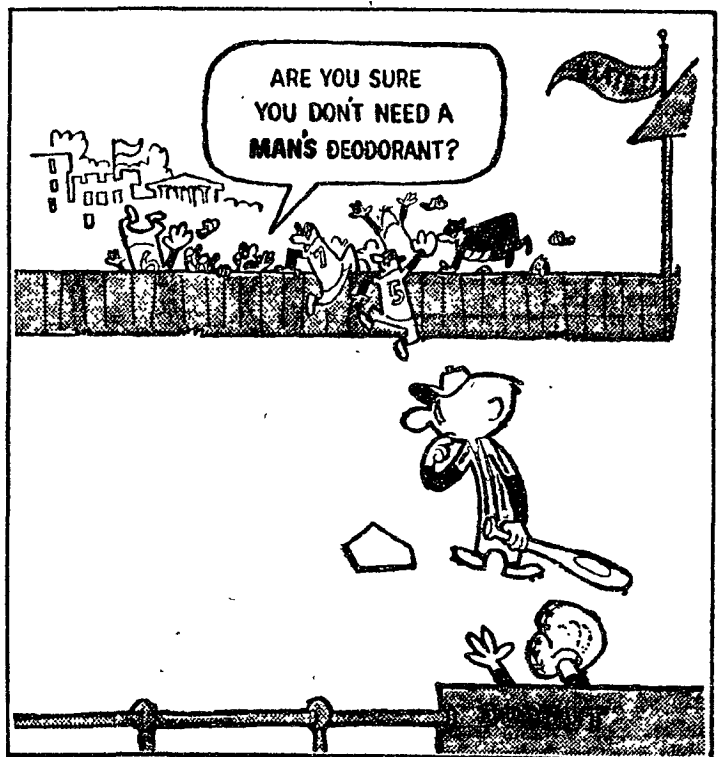

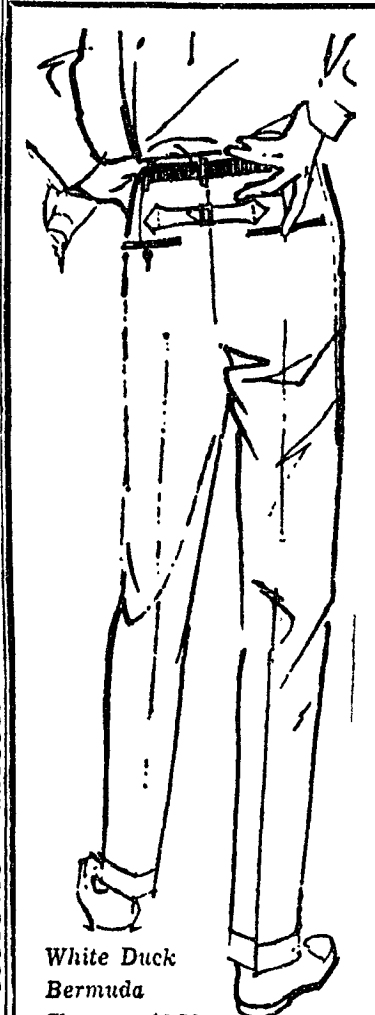
