

Lion-Pitt Golfers May Get Confused: 'Reilly? Which Reilly Do You Mean?'

When Penn State's golfers lay their undefeated record on the line Saturday against the University of Pittsburgh in the Steel City, passersby are likely to get a little confused with the names of two participants—Pat and Bill Reilly.

Pat is the number one man and captain of Coach Joe Boyle's Nittany aspirin pounders, while Bill, Pat's brother, is number two man and captain of the Panthers.

How did the pair come to enter different colleges? "Well," the soft-spoken Lion captain explained, "Bill wanted to strike out for himself at a different school. All during high school, he sort of played in my shadow."

And it may be a good thing that the Panther half of the brother combination isn't going to meet Pat when the two Eastern powers collide. For Bill has found it tough to beat his brother, even though he may have been successful striking out on his own.

"To tell the truth," Pat said, "the only time I've ever played against him in competition was for a country club championship at Sharon. I won, 3 and 2."

Explaining the victory over his brother, Pat touched on one of Bill's outstanding characteristics temperament. "He had me 1 down after nine holes," Pat said, "but he tried to take a shortcut on the tenth hole, and landed in some trees. By the time he came out, he was missing three clubs and a few strokes. He exploded after that, and I won easily."

"Bill always gambles," Pat continued, "and you could compare him to Billy Joe Patton (notorious for taking big chances)." According to Pat, his brother is constantly letting off steam on the course, "but it doesn't affect his play. He sort of gets tight if he isn't mad at something."

To prove his point, Pat pointed out the incident that happened during Bill's match with State's Jim Gerhart last year.

"Bill got stuck in a trap, and he couldn't see the green or the flag. He blasted out and didn't like the shot, so he broke his club, uttered some vernacular explicatives, and bounced his head on the ground—as the ball rolled in the cup. Bill drove Gerhart out of his mind last year, and beat him."

Does this odd situation put a strain on Reilly's parents? Pat

said his folks never play favorites. "My father will go nine around nine holes with me, then switch to my brother," Pat said. His mother does the same thing.

Of course, each of the brothers has their own view as to the winner of Saturday's match. "My brother thinks Pitt will smack us good," Pat chuckled, "but I know we're going to chew

them up." Win or lose, there's consolation in the fact that the two aren't playing on the same team. "We've played in two better-ball tournaments together, winning one and coming in second in the other," Pat said. I'm the only one who can play with him and put up with his temperament because I just ignore it."
