

Archaeology Prof to Talk On Israel's Negev Desert

Dr. Nelson Glueck, president and professor of archaeology at the Hebrew Union College, will give a public lecture at 8 p.m. tomorrow in the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation.

He will speak on, "In the Footsteps of Abraham; Archaeology in the Negev."

Glueck has been a pioneer in the archaeology of the Negev desert of Israel. He is a professor of Biblical archaeology. Union College is part of the Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati and New York.

Yale Dean Will Speak At Chapel

Rev. Liston Pope, dean of the Yale University Divinity School, will speak at 10:55 a.m. chapel in Schwab Auditorium.

He will speak on, "With All Thy Mind."

Chapel Choir, directed by Wila C. Taylor, will sing "Beyond the Tabernacle of God" by Healy Willan. George E. Ceiga, University organist, will play "Choral Prelude on Dandee" by C. Hubert Parry, the offertory "If Thou But Suffer God to Guide Thee" by Flor Peeters and the postlude "Martys" from "Three Psalm Tune Postludes" by Harvey Grace.

Dr. Pope is the Gilbert L. Stark professor of social ethics and an associate fellow of Saybrook College in Yale University. A native of North Carolina, he received his first two degrees from Duke University and his doctor's degree from Yale. He also holds three other advanced degrees.

He is an ordained minister of the United Church of Christ. He has served on both the National and World Council of Churches. He is presently directing the Rockefeller Brothers Theological Fellowships program.

Besides being a lecturer and preacher, Dr. Pope frequently contributes to such journals as the "Saturday Review of Literature." He is the author of the books "Millhands and Preachers" and "The Kingdom Beyond Caste."

This is the third in a series of Hillel lectures designed to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the State of Israel.

Miss Genevieve Dilts, associate director of the University Christian Association, will be the speaker at the Protestant Service of Worship at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel.

Her topic will be "Three Pictures of the Prodigal Son." Rev. Hal Leiper, Protestant chaplain, will conduct the order of worship. The Thursday Vesper Choir will sing the anthems, "Blessed are the Merciful," by Menegali, and "Blessed Are They Who Do Thy Will," by Martini.

Miss Dilts is a graduate of the Friends University at Wichita, Kansas. She directed the Wesley Foundation at the University of Arizona and the YWCA at Ohio State University before coming here.

The Wesley Foundation Fireside Forum will be held at 6:15 p.m. tomorrow in the Student Foundation. The panel discussion is entitled "The Great In-Laws."

Horse Show To Be Held At Stables

Student riding enthusiasts are competing this weekend in the Ninth Annual Horse Show sponsored by the Riding Club at the University riding stables from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. today and from 1 to 5:30 p.m. tomorrow.

In addition to University students, a riding team from Penn Hall Junior College in Chambersburg, and Greer School in Tyrone will compete with the University riding team. Members of the team are Judith Maguire, sophomore in radio and television from Pottsville; David Klaer, junior in arts and letters from Ithaca, N.Y.; and Harvey Worrell, senior in animal husbandry from Philadelphia.

Individual competition will be divided into three divisions—hunter, jumper and horsemanship. The latter division is broken down into beginner, intermediate and advanced classes.

Six ribbons and one trophy will be awarded in each of the 24 classes. Awards will be presented after each individual event. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Sterling, riding teachers from Harrisburg, will be judges.

Top riders in the championship hunter and jumper competition will win cash prizes.

A private riding team has been formed by three students who own their own horses. Judith Scattergood, senior in general agriculture from West Chester, Mary Whelen, freshman in arts and letters from Narbeth, and Walter Layman will compete against the visiting schools and the University riding team.

WDFM to Present 2 Recitals, Lecture

Music on campus this weekend will include a recital by the oriental violinist Toshiya Eto, a lieder and piano recital by Margaret Lowenfeld and Barry Brinsmaid and a lecture on Richard Wagner's "Ring of the Nibelung" by G. William Henninger, professor of music over WDFM.

Toshiya Eto, a pupil of Efram Zimbalist and now on the faculty of the Curtis Institute, will give a recital in the Hetzel Union auditorium at 8 tonight. There will be no admission charge.

Eto will play Sonata No. 9 in A major, op. 47, by Beethoven; Sonata No. 3 in O minor, op. 108, by Brahms; Sonata in G minor, op. 108, by Brahms; Sonata in G minor by Claude Debussy; Siegfried-Paraphrase by Wagner-Wilhelm and Sarasateana (Suite of Spanish Dances) by Zimbalist.

New York critics have acclaimed Eto a top-rank violinist by international standards.

Barry Brinsmaid of the music department and Margaret Lowenfeld, mezzo-soprano, will hold a song and piano recital at 8:30 tonight in the Hillel Foundation Auditorium. They will play a mixed program of Bach, Schumann, Wols and Brahms. Brinsmaid will also play a piano solo, "Fantasy in C Minor," by Mozart. Henninger will present a lecture on Richard Wagner's "Ring of the Nibelung," illustrated by music from the last act of each of the four dramas, from 7 to 11:30 p.m. tomorrow over radio station WDFM.

Cheer Tryouts Will Begin

Annual Ag Contests Planned for Today

Agriculture students will participate in two special events today—a cattle judging contest at the new dairy barns and a tractor driving contest in the parking lot beside the Forestry Building.

Opening the annual dairy exposition of the College of Agriculture, the cattle judging contest will be held at 9 a.m. today.

Students will compete in two divisions. Those classified as amateur will rank a group of four cows in order of all-over superiority in their class. There are two classes of four cows each for each of the five major dairy cattle breeds.

Competitors in the professional division will judge the same 10 classes and give reasons why they ranked the cows in a certain order.

Roger Emig, field man for the Southern Pennsylvania Artificial Breeders Cooperative, will judge.

A cattle judging team from the University of West Virginia will participate in the professional division for practice.

Awards for the competition will be presented at a banquet on May 10 at Penn's Valley School. There will be a first and second prize for each breed in each division, three additional prizes for giving

the best reasons and three awards for placing highest in each division.

At 1 p.m., participants in the second contest will show their skill in driving a tractor. Anyone is eligible to enter the competition and three tractors will be available so that contestants may choose a model they are familiar with.

Men and coeds will compete in events to test maneuvering skill and safety habits. They will hitch a tractor to a farm implement, drive through an obstacle course with the implement attached and then back it into a tight place. Tractor inspection skill will also be judged.

Safe handling practices will be important since the contest was designed to promote better driving habits to prevent farm accidents. Clashing gears, excessive speed and standing while operating the tractor will result in a loss of points.

A trophy will be presented.

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
