

Lectures, Exhibits on Music, Art Planned for Weekend

Two art lectures, two music lectures, and two art exhibits will comprise the cultural aspects of the weekend's activities.

Mrs. Edith Gregor Halpert, an authority on American painting, and owner and director of the New York Downtown Gallery, will discuss "American Art" at 3 p.m. tomorrow in the Hetzel Union Gallery.

A tea at 4 p.m., following her discussion, will mark the opening of the annual spring exhibition of student art work done in art, art education, architecture and home arts classes.

Bernard S. Myers, professor of art history at City College, New York City, will lecture at 8 tonight on "Expressionism in Modern Painting: A Generation in Revolt." He is a noted lecturer and

has written extensively on various aspects of modern painting.

"A Sense of History in Musical Interpretations" will be the topic of a speech by Hans Nathan of the School of Historical Studies, the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton University, at 11 a.m. today in the HUB Auditorium.

He will also speak at 1:30 p.m. tomorrow in 214 HUB on "The Dodecaphonic Composition of Luigi Dallapiccola." Nathan is an authority on contemporary music, jazz, folk and medieval music.

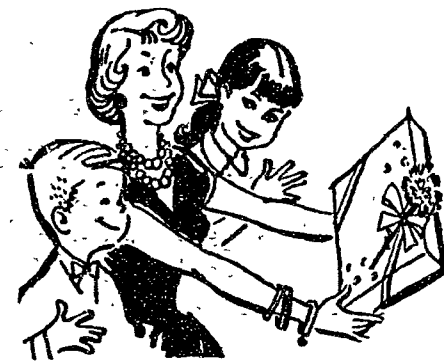
