Kowalski Receives Fellowship

Lawrence Kowalski, senior in political science from Hazleton, has been awarded the \$1800 Knapp Fellowship in Political Science offered by the University of Wisconsin.

He plans to begin graduate work this fall at Wisconsin, working first for his master of arts degree and then for his doctor of philosophy degree. He will specialize in political theory and political behavior studies.

Two other scholarships were also awarded to him: the \$1400 Woodrow Wilson Fellowship at Princeton University and the \$600 John W. White Fellowship from Penn State. He will retain the White award, and since he has accepted the Wisconsin grant, he will be an Honorary Woodrow Wilson Fellow.

Kowalski has held scholarships throughout his undergraduate career at the University. He received a \$100 state scholarship for all four years and this year won the \$250 Kunkel Scholarship. Last year he held the \$100 Class of 1920 Scholarship and the \$100 Liberal Arts Scholarship.

He attended the University's Hazleton Center for two years and while there was president of its student council. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, national honorary scholastic society; Phi Kappa Phi, honorary scholarship fraternity; Phi Gamma Mu, honorary social science society; the Slavic Club, and the Intercollegiate Conference on Government.
