

Motherwell to Speak At Chapel Tonight

Robert Motherwell, of the Department of Arts at Hunter College, will speak at 8 tonight in the Memorial Lounge of the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel.

He will give the final lecture, "Religion and Contemporary Art," in the series, "Explorations in Religion and the Arts."

F & M Prof Will Speak At Chapel

Dr. G. Wayne Glick, associate professor of religion at Franklin and Marshall College, will speak at the 10:55 a.m. chapel service in Schwab Auditorium.

Dr. Glick, a native of Bridgewater, Va., received his bachelor of arts degree from Bridgewater College, and his master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees from the University of Chicago. He is an ordained minister in the Church of the Brethren.

Before taking his present position at Franklin and Marshall, Dr. Glick was assistant principal at Mr. Sidney High School in Virginia; pastor of the Church of the Brethren at Richmond, Va.; assistant pastor of the Warren Avenue Congregational Church in Chicago; pastor of the York Center Church of the Brethren in Lombard, Ill.; and professor of biblical studies at Juniata College.

Dr. Glick is a member of the National Association of Biblical Instructors, the Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis and the American Association of University Professors.

The Chapel Choir, under the direction of Miss Willa C. Taylor will sing as its anthem, "Alleluia," by Randall Thompson. As postlude George Ceiga, University organist, will play his own composition, "Fugue on the Alleluia."

Dining in Bermudas Will Be Permitted

French Mime Artist To Present Lecture

Etienne Decroux, founder of the School of Mime in Paris and teacher at the Senior Dramatic Workshop and Actors Studio in New York, will present a lecture-demonstration of the art of mime-acting at 8 p.m. Monday in Schwab Auditorium.

His program will consist of "Man in Sport," "Man in Society," "Man as a Moving Statue" and "Man in Dream." There is no admission charge.

The program is not designed primarily to entertain, but to explain and demonstrate the art and science of mime. Decroux, who deals with mime in a pure form, will show its use as another type of language.

A pupil of Edward Gordon Craig, Decroux is the teacher of Jean-Louis Barrault, leading actor of the Comedie-Francaise; Alvin Epstein, American actor and mime; and Marcel Marceau, noted French mime.

Decroux, a teacher and demonstrator of the use of the body to communicate, has been called one of the four important influences on contemporary French drama.

Since 1931 Decroux has performed, alone and with his company, 38 original mime programs. In 1941 he established the Mime Theatre in Paris, where he created, with Barrault and later the mime company, several stage and film productions. These all exhibited the enormous potentialities of mime acting.

Decroux has taught and performed in Belgium, Switzerland, Israel, Holland, England, Italy, Sweden and Austria.

His lectures will be given in French and immediately translated by Mark Epstein, one of his pupils.

The program is sponsored by the Department of Theatre Arts.


Soph Will Receive Lion's Paw Grant
