

# Golfers End Undeclared Year

## Notch Easy 6-1 Triumph Over Bisons

When the dust cleared from Penn State's 6-1 golf triumph over Bucknell yesterday on the University course, Eastern Intercollegiate champion Bill Davidson had lost his third straight match, Scott Stultz had wrapped up a perfect season and the Nittany squad had its fourth undefeated season in the bag.

The Lion linksmen, with the exception of Davidson, just had too many guns for Bucknell, winning six matches by wide margins for victory number 10. Nittany golf teams have gone undefeated in 1948, 1953 and 1955.

Stockily-built Stultz and EIGA king Davidson were the big surprises. Before the match, Stultz was shifted to the number five slot—Charlie Decker was sick and couldn't play—and proceeded to knock off Bison George Harde for his tenth win, 3 and 2. During the course of the season, the undefeated Lion played in the fifth, a sixth and seventh slots.

Davidson, who wound up the season with a 6-4 record, lost to Bucknell's Bill Curtis, 1 up after 19 holes. It was his third consecutive loss since winning the Eastern title two weekends ago.

The five remaining Lion winners coasted to victory. "Mighty mite" John Felus recorded his sixth win in ten starts, besting Jerry Lindholm, 6 and 4. Captain Pat Reilly duplicated Felus' record as he outplayed Dick Bartholomew, 3 and 2.

Bob Bainbridge and Roy Altman chalked up identical 9-1 season records as they fattened the scoring with wins over Tom Miller, 3 and 1, and John McDonald, 8 and 7, respectively.

Playing his first varsity match in place of the ailing Decker, Don Bernhart produced a more than creditable showing with a 5 and 4 triumph over the Bisons' Bob Ayers. Decker's season ended with a 6-3 record.

Davidson's loss could be attributed to a number of factors:

a letdown against a decidedly weaker opponent, the better than average playing of his opponent, or the general atmosphere of the match.

Explaining the last reason, Nittany mentor Joe Boyle said "He (Curtis) started off slashing around and scoring bogies, then Bill (Davidson) found himself

easing up and doing the same thing. Then all of a sudden, Curtis birdied two or three holes and Davidson couldn't get back on track.

"Sometimes you'll ease up against a weaker opponent," the Lion coach said, "and then if he gets hot, you just can't start playing real well again."

## Nyce Paces Nittany Javelin Throwers

The Lion cindermen, sporting a much-improved javelin contingent, will meet Manhattan College in New York Saturday.

Varsity Track Coach Chick Werner mentioned the javelin as one of the Nittanies' most improved events and as one of the deciding factors in the Lions' victory over Pitt last Saturday.

Andy Nyce, the Lions' number one weight man, led a Lion sweep in the javelin as he recorded a throw of 182' 7 1/2". Nyce is a new man in the event and has progressed rapidly.

The husky junior is the Nittanies' top scorer in the outdoor season with a total of 38 points in the Lions' last four outings.

In early May, Nyce was putting the shot at 44' 5 1/2". He recorded a 48' 9 1/4" throw against Pitt. Nyce hit the 131' 4" mark in the discus against the Mountaineers earlier this month. He recorded a 153' 3" throw against Michigan one week later. His distance in the javelin

against the Mountaineers was 162' 5" — 187' 7 1/2" against Pitt.

Second place scorer for the Lions is miler and two-miler Fred Kerr.

The Nittanies will lose the services of seniors Jim Norton, Ogie Norris and Buster Thomas next year. Co-captain Norton, who with Dick Hambright recorded a 47.7 in the 440 against Pitt will give up his quarter-mile slot to freshman Don Davies. Davies ran a 49.2 quarter against the Panther Cubs.

The Lions will have a little more trouble replacing co-captain Norris in the pole vault. Norris is the holder of both the Penn State frosh record 13' 6" and the varsity record 14'. Dick Gross and Bruce Waldo will be joined by freshman vaulters Pete Peters, Ron Beard and Mel Mores as possible starters next year.

Buster Thomas will yield his berth in the 100-yard dash to freshman sensation Bob Brown.

## Georgetown Netters Blast Lions, But Jacobs Wins

Georgetown's powerful tennis team gave the Penn State netters an unfriendly welcome to the nation's capital yesterday by smashing the Lions, 8-1. Dick Jacobs was the only victor.

The Hoyas, one of the top teams in the East with an 11-5 record including today's win, now have put the pressure on the Lion netters' hopes for a winning season. Now 4-5, they must win their remaining two matches against Navy today and Pitt on Friday.

Georgetown entered the Nittany Valley last year laden with sophomores and handed the Nittanies a 6-3 defeat. Yesterday another young team was shown off, including three juniors who faced the Lions last year and two sophomores.

Dick Jacobs offered the only bright spot for the Lions as he rallied to overcome a 1-6 first set loss to win the last two sets from Junior Pete Coleman, 7-5, 6-3.

Chuck Questa, playing his second match at the number one spot, was impressive in dropping his test to Dick Razzetti. Razzetti, a sophomore playing first man, is a fine example of the Hoyas' young crop of netters.

Captain Fred Trust lost to Pete King, 4-6, 6-2, 1-6, in the number two match. After a fine comeback second set, Trust pulled a groin muscle which handicapped him in the deciding set.

Charlie Bibleheimer gave a somewhat puzzling performance that has been characteristic of many Lion matches this year by winning the middle set with a 6-0 shutout, but yet dropping the other two sets by extreme 2-6, 1-6 scores.

Both Penn State's first year varsity players, Gene Flick and Mel Royer, lost their matches to juniors Ed Shapiro and Pete Cogan, respectively.

Trust and Questa lost the first doubles match by default after Trust couldn't continue because of his injury. The Lion duo had won the first set, 10-8, and dropped the second, 0-6.

The Lions have a chance to beat Navy today since the Middies, a top pre-season choice because of last year's 13-3 record,

have been hit by injuries. As a result, they now have a 4-7 season log not including a contest they played at Cornell Saturday.

It should be a close match since they beat Maryland, 7-2, a team that beat the Lions earlier this year. They also beat Bucknell, 9-0, a team the Lions beat 8-1. The Lions and the Middies both lost, 4-0, to their only other common foe, Colgate.

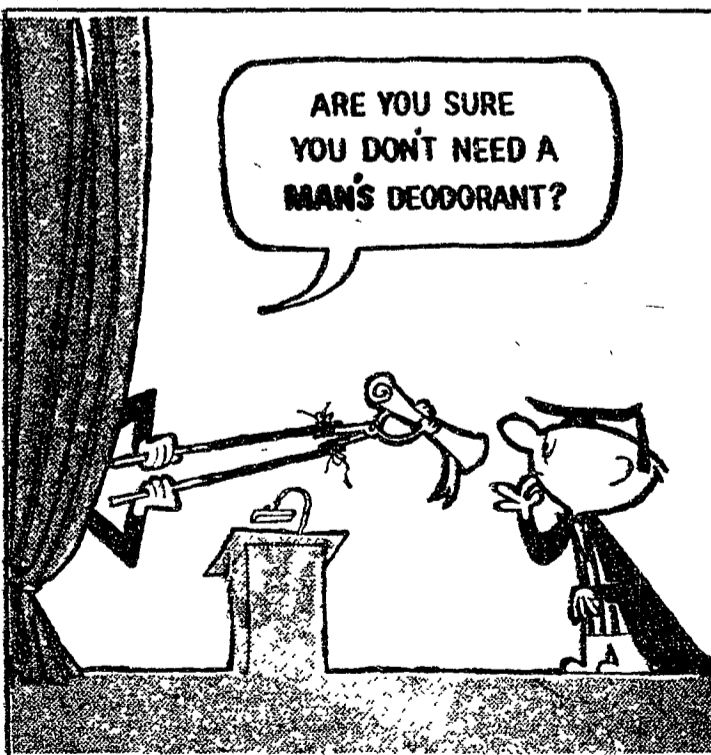
