

Amato Sweeps Firsts In High, Broad Jumps

Alpha Phi Delta's Benny Amato made a clean sweep of the Intramural jumping events last night by taking a first in the high jump and the broad jump.

Amato tied his record of last year in the high jump at 5' 8 3/4" and dethroned last year's broad jump champ, Clayton Carter of Omega Psi Phi. Amato leaped 19' 1 3/4". Carter seemed to be having trouble starting off. He barely cleared 17 feet.

Delta Upsilon's Ray Hoopes copped second place in the broad jump, jumping 18' 10 1/2". Only an inch shorter in third place was Dick Jackowsky of Tau Kappa Epsilon. In fourth place was Jim Glueck, Alpha Sigma Phi, with a 17' 11 3/4" jump. Finishing in fifth place was Leroy Edwards of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

Finishing second behind Amato in the high jump was Kappa Delta Rho's Jim Shaffer. Shaffer cleared the standard at 5' 6 1/2".

Third place honors were split three ways between DU's Hoopes, Alpha Sig's King Ching, and Beta Theta Pi's John Urban.

A new record was set in the shot put by Sigma Phi Epsilon's Andy Stynchula. Stynchula's toss (46' 1 1/2") soared four inches past the old record set in 1955 by Frank Urban, Phi Delta Theta.

Lambda Chi Alpha's Jack Calderone came closest to beating Stynchula but yet he was far off at 39' 2 3/4".

Bringing up third place was Ed Henrie of Sigma Alpha Epsilon with a 36' 11 1/4" toss. Rounding out the top five were Wally Darran of Tau Kappa Epsilon and Denny Shaffer of Phi Gamma Delta.

In the independent finals Jim Barton, last year's high jump champion, and George Hammond tied for first place in the high jump, leaping 5' 8 3/4".

Al Kettering copped first place in the indie broad jump by jumping 17 1/2 feet. Ray Maestriperi took second place with a 16' 11" jump. Chuck Schuler finished third, close behind Maestriperi—16' 6 3/4".

In the shot put Dick Ashbaugh took first place, tossing the shot 39 feet and inches. Dave Truitt, one of Rip Engle's boys, copped second place with a 39-foot, 6-inch throw.

The finals in the 100 yard dash, 440 and the 880 relay will be held at 6:45 tonight at Beaver field.

Navy Blasts Netmen; Winning Season Lost

Navy's tennis team sunk any hopes the Nittany Netters had for a winning season yesterday when it scored a smashing 9-0 victory at Annapolis, Maryland.

The victorious Middies were forced to go the full three sets in only four matches. Navy coach Bob Bender said it was the Middies' best team effort of the season.

The lone Lion standout in a losing cause was Captain Fred Trust. Trust, who was returned to his number one post by Coach Sherm Fogg, as he lost to the Navy's Captain, John Griffiths 1-6, 7-5, 4-6.

Junior Charles Bibleheimer, playing in the number two slot, dropped two sets to Dave Houghton 6-1, 6-0.

Charles Questa played third in coach Fogg's revamped lineup after playing in the lead-off post Tuesday at Georgetown. He did not respond well to the lineup change as he lost two sets to Dick Johnson, 6-0, 6-2.

Sophomore Gene Flick, playing fourth, did not fare much better as he lost, 6-4, 6-3, to Navy's Marion Osburn. Senior Dick Jacobs, lone victor

against Georgetown, started off well against Navy's Nick Temple, winning 6-4. He extended Temple in the second set 5-7, but his attack faltered in the final set as he lost 6-0.

Navy's Guy Parson continued Navy's decisive two set victories in the final singles match. He defeated first year varsity player, Mel Royer, 6-1, 6-1.
