

# 3 Cornet Soloists to Perform In Blue Band Concert Sunday

Three cornet soloists will be featured at the annual spring concert of the Penn State Blue Band to be held at 3 p.m. Sunday on the Pattee Library steps. The audience has been invited to bring chairs, pillows and blankets and sit on the grass.

James Ressler, junior in music education from Lebanon, James Shugert, sophomore in music education from Huntingdon, and Jere Fridy, senior in music education from

Palmyra, will be soloists for "Carnival Variations," written by Don Jacoby and William McRae.

Fridy, president of the Blue Band, also will play the solo part for the "The Magic Trumpet" by James F. Burke.

The band, conducted by James W. Dunlop, associate professor of musical education, will open its program with the National Anthem.

Other numbers to be played are "Coat of Arms Concert March" by George Kenny; "Chester Overture" by William Schuman; and "Frescoes" by Haydn Wood, which includes four parts, "Vienna, 1913," "Sea Shanties," "The Bandstand" and "Hyde Park."

The trombone section will be featured in "Holiday for Trombones" by David Rose arranged by C. Paul Herfurth.

Also on the program are "Habenera," by Paul Durand and Henri Conet arranged by Floyd E. Werle; "The Golden Cockerel, Introduction and Wedding March" by Rimsky-Korsakov, arranged by A. A. Harding; and "Music for a Carnival" by Clare Grundman.

"Doodletown Fifers" by Sauter-Finegan arranged by Wilfred Roberts will be played as recorded by Sauter-Finegan.

John Philip Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever" will be the final number.

In case of rain the concert will be held in Schwab Auditorium.

# Frosh Talent Show Replaces Fun Night

A "Class Night" freshman talent show will replace the Orientation Week Fun Night next fall.

All-University Cabinet voted unanimously last night to expend a maximum of \$285 in funds for the "talent" night.

In the past, Fun Night, the climaxing event of Orientation Week, included a dance and entertainment by a master of ceremonies.

The talent revue next year will be the major entertainment, and a dance will follow.

Jere Fridy, former chairman of the Board of Dramatics and Forensics, said he felt the new program would definitely promote greater class spirit.

In a discussion about the cost of the show John Gingrich, All-University secretary-treasurer, told Cabinet the changes might run over \$347 if costs of orchestra, recreation hall and refreshments were included. The Fun

Night cost \$187 in 1957 and 1956, he said.

Fridy said it has been agreed that the Phi Mu Alpha Dance Band will play for the dance free of charge since the "night" will be a University function.

He said that \$285 was chosen as a maximum figure after a discussion with Dean of Men Frank J. Simes. The estimated costs for refreshments would raise the costs over last year, he said.

Fridy also suggested the talent show might be used to kick off the freshman customs and to introduce cheers.

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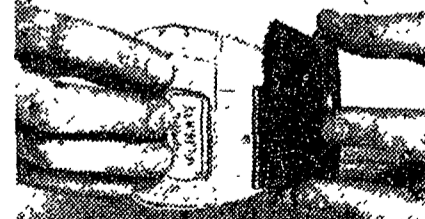
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
