

Council Serves 3500 Town Men

Some 3500 men students live in apartments and rooming houses in town and elsewhere.

For many of them, their last class of the day is their last contact with the campus until their first class the next day.

These are the Town Independent Men, called—as is typical in the alphabetical age—TIM, sometimes the "town indies."

To bind these men more closely to their University, the TIM Council was formed as a division of the Association of Independent Men and serves as a liaison between the town indies and the higher student governing bodies.

TIM is working with the committee on the orientation of transfer students in the Orientation Week program. Several meetings and a dance are scheduled for transfer students during the week.

The group will be trying to get a definite working plan for Club TIM this year. Club TIM is to be a private social club for town indie men. It will include a study room, a lounge and a snack bar. TIM is going to start a fund to get money to buy a building for the club.

It is working on the idea of having a recreation cabin at the Stone Valley site but as yet no definite plans have been made.

TIM will hold its annual Fall Dance in the Hetzel Union ballroom. It will only hold one dance this year instead of two. It will also enter teams in the intramural activities. It will be working with the dean of men's office on the question of living conditions for the town indie men.

Anyone wishing to be on the TIM Council can nominate himself by submitting a petition of 20 signed names of town indie men. He must be an independent living off campus, must have a 2.0 All-University average and must have at least two semesters left at the University. He may not be on probation of any kind. Elections for council members will be held early this fall.

There will be 26 positions available on council. The seven

or eight (depending on population) men who get the highest number of votes will get seats on AIM.

The officers for this year are Charles Bartholomew, president; Louis Testen, vice president; Charles Garman, secretary and Richard Wilt, treasurer.

AA Represents Sports Groups In Government

The Athletic Association takes part in the election of managers for all varsity sports, sits in on the athletic advisory board and has a seat on the All-University Cabinet.

The captains and coaches of the varsity sports aid the AA president in the conducting of the elections for managers of varsity sports.

In addition to the AA president, the Athletic Advisory Board includes: Ernest McCoy, dean of the College of Physical Education, students, faculty and alumni members. A total of 10 persons sits on the board.

The board also works along with the Women's Recreation Association in sponsoring Fun Night during Orientation Week.

This year's officers are Fred Kerr, president; Howard Maierhoffer, vice president; and Thomas Hancock, secretary. These officers hold office from May to May.

The officers are elected by male students in the spring election. The AA meets four or five times a year.

Physical Plant's New Post Goes To Yeagley

Henry L. Yeagley Jr., has been promoted from administrative assistant to the director of Physical Plant.

The new position was created to meet the administrative needs of the department now facing increased activity related to the

long-range program and growth of the University, explained President Eric A. Walker.

Schreffler, local contractor, and during World War II, he served with the U.S. Air Force.

A graduate of State College high school, Yeagley received his bachelor of arts degree from the University and has completed much of his work toward a master of science degree in business administration.

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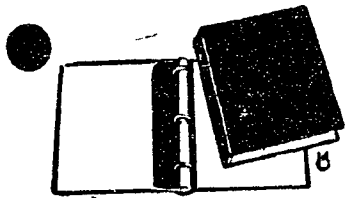
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
