

Science Teachers Study Under Grant

Fifty high school science teachers will study at the University this fall under a \$286,000 grant from the National Science Foundation.

The program is designed to improve the nation's science education. Refresher courses, observation of laboratory activities and guest lectures will be offered. The teachers will spend a year on campus, beginning this month. They will take courses in such fields as botany, chemistry, science education, geology, mathematics, physics, zoology and meteorology.

Nuclear Eng Department Established

The College of Engineering and Architecture has established a Department of Nuclear Engineering.

The department, for administrative rather than academic purposes, will offer no degrees and no specialized curriculum.

Two 3-credit courses are already offered in nuclear engineering. These courses, as well as a graduate program, will now be administered by the new department.

No plans have been made to add new courses, according to Earl B. Stavely, associate dean of the Engineering and Architecture College. However, Stavely said the new department head, when chosen, may want to add new courses.

According to President Eric A. Walker, the present move was designed to strengthen the nation's atoms-for-peace program and provide the means for training young men and women in this area.

Merritt A. Williamson, dean of the Engineering and Architecture College, said the department's major objectives were the planning and organization of courses, utilization of the present reactor staff on the teaching faculty and promotion of graduate work and research in the field of nuclear engineering.

The University is the home of one of the nation's first campus-based research reactors.

The teachers will be regular graduate students. Fifty of the teachers attending the program have been awarded \$3000 stipends.

The program is under the sponsorship of the Colleges of Chemistry and Physics, Liberal Arts, Agriculture, Mineral Industries and Education.

Courses are coordinated through the office of Arts and Science Extension. Director of the institute is William H. Powers, director of the extension. Dr. Robert L. Weber, associate professor of physics, is associate director.

Eighteen other colleges and universities are included in the National Science Foundation program. The University began holding summer institutes independently in 1954.

Community Living Returns to Campus

"Community living" has returned to the campus after a semester's layoff with the housing of some 70 women transfer students in the converted Irvin Hall in the West Halls area.

The women will dine with the men students in the Waring Hall dining rooms during the year.

Thompson Hall had been used since 1951 to house freshmen women prior to last February.

It will mark the first time that Irvin Hall, formerly known as Varsity Hall, has housed women students. The building was completed in 1924 to provide living quarters for athletes who formerly had been living in the Old Trach House.

Director of Housing Otto E. Mueller has also announced that the Graduate Hall for the first time during the regular academic year will be occupied by graduate students.

Forty-five men have been assigned to 20 rooms in the east wing and 34 women assigned to the west wing. They will eat in McAllister Hall.

The building, formerly known as Women's Building, is the first residence hall for graduate students in a regular academic year.

The decision to utilize Irvin Hall for women students was made during the summer, Mueller explained, when it became apparent that the women's residence halls could not provide facilities for all of the women students who would be enrolled on the campus.

The University's student body, through the All-University Cabinet, requested the administration last semester to continue community living facilities.

Both men and women students are to share dining and recreational facilities in some areas in the future.

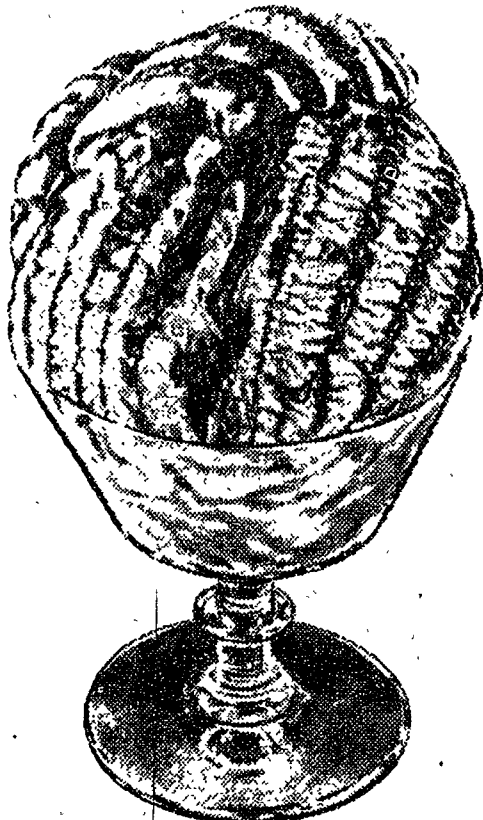

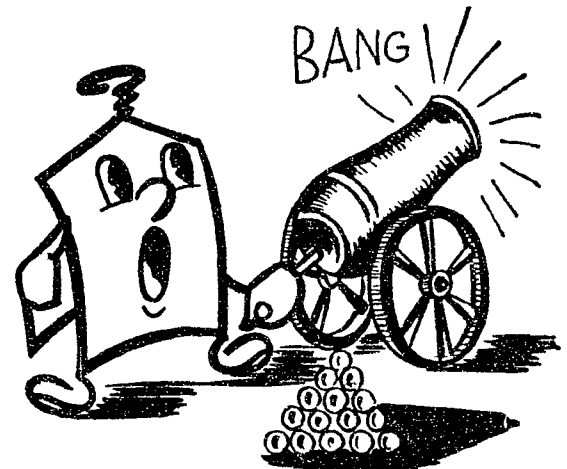
