

IFC Check System Becomes Effective

The Interfraternity Council weekend checking system went into effect last night.

Five-man teams, including a member of the IFC Board of Control, will check on the conduct in fraternity parties each weekend this year. Ronald Siders, Board of Control chairman, will serve as chairman of the checking system.

Each fraternity will supply three members to the teams. So far 25 houses have volunteered members. The checkers may inspect the fraternity's first, second and third floors and the basement for infractions of the IFC rules.

All checkers will present IFC identification cards when they check the fraternities, Siders said.

Siders will explain the complete checking system at the regular IFC meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday in the Hetzel Union Assembly Room. He will also explain the deferred rushing program and the newly adopted Board of Control interpretations at the group's first meeting.

IFC president Edward Hintz said the IFC executive committee will meet Monday afternoon in Dean O. Edward Pollock's office to plan the meeting's agenda.

Theodore Halier, IFC public relations chairman, will present at the meeting a progress report of his committee's work and list additional suggestions for improving relations between the fraternities and the State College community.

The organization is a secret society formed in 1908 "for the purpose of bringing together representative men of the senior class to discuss and promote the interests of the University."

The society taps about 15 junior men each spring. Sometimes the names of these members are withheld until a group picture is printed in LaVie, the yearbook, the following spring.
