Food service does not try to discourage coeds from eating breakfast, he indicated, but is making efforts to accommodate them.

Proffitt suggested that much of the line congestion may be related to the fact that the dining hall has been in full-time operation for only two weeks. Such congestion is frequent at first when students are confronted with a new dining situation, he said.

Referring to the coeds, he said, "I'm really sorry that they've been inconvenienced."

Redifer Hall, which serves all the women's South Residence Halls, was opened last spring on a part-capacity basis. All four dining rooms are open for lunch and dinner, Proffitt said.
