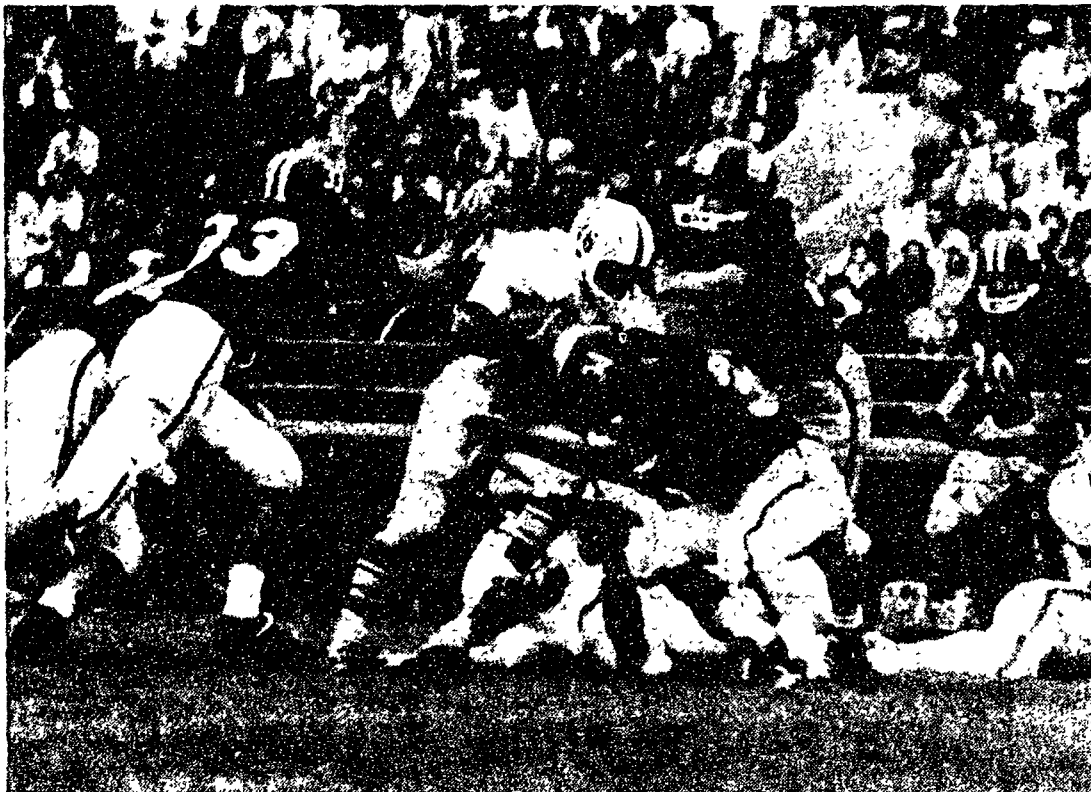
Kasperian Scores Two Touchdowns

(Continued from page one) seconds after that whistle, Botula had dropped his guard and Troychak came ramming in from the side.

It was a disheartening blow for the Lions. For even though Botula was not needed for the remainder of the Penn tilt, his loss can do nothing but hurt the Lion offensive. He leads the Nittanians in total rushing yardage for two games with 194 yards, picking up 72 yards in 15 carries against the Quakers.

That performance, incidentally, earned Botula "best back" honors by the writers in the Franklin Field press box. Guard Chuck Ruslavage was the top lineman choice.

But Botula was not the only impressive back on Franklin Field

in the half. Kerr blasted over left tackle from five yards out for the Lions' final six-pointer.

Two veteran performers—Bucky Paolone and "Old Man" Dave Kasperian—scored the other Penn State TDs. Paolone opened the Lion scoring in 11:37 of the first frame with a razzle-dazzle somersault over the clogged-up middle line from two yards out. Kasperian made it 13-0 with a 1-yard dive (and that's what it was, literally) in the second quarter, and scored again in the third period on a 2-yard slant over right tackle.

It might be noted there that Kasperian became the Lions' "bread and butter" man after

Botula injury. He gained much of the "crucial" yardage in the second and third quarters, finishing behind Botula in the final rushing statistics with 45 yards in 15 carries.

The Lions took advantage of the new 2-point conversion rule to score their remaining six markers. All of the PATS came on passes—Jacks to John Bozick, Jacks to Paolone and Lucas to Jim Schwab.

Actually, from the standpoint of the unbiased grid fan, the game was dull, dreary and unexciting. (Of course the dismal, overcast weather may have had something to do with this.) But to Penn

State fans, it was just what the doctor had ordered after last week's humiliating loss to Nebraska.

The Lions completely dominated the tilt, controlling the ball for 97 offensive plays to Penn's 41. And despite the high scoring of the affair, the Quakers possessed the ball for only nine series of downs. They couldn't get past their own 43-yard stripe in the first half and were forced into punt situations from the 32-, 39-, 43-(twice) and 21-yard lines.

Twice after the intermission, Penn penetrated past State's 20-yard line, but both times interceptions—one by sopho-

more Wayne Beriefed on the 3 and by Bruce Gilmore on the 10—halted the threats. It was the worst beating ever dealt to Penn in the 47-game series. However, the Quakers hold the all-time scoring mark, with a 47-0 win in 1899.
