## Dulles Sends Message To Reassure Chiang

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles sought to reassure Chiang Kai-shek Thursday of continued U.S. support for his Nationalist China government.

Dulles sent a message to Formosa in the wake of Chiang's outcry Wednesday against statements by Dulles the day before.

Dulles said Thursday he wanted to straighten out confusion compounded—what he called "an exaggerated idea of a shift of position on our part . . . misinterpreting the misinterpretation."

Dulles did not deny any shift in policy. Although his news conference remarks two days ago were widely interpreted that way, State Department officials said it was more a shift in emphasis than a shift in policy.

## Ike Calls Conference

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower has called a White House strategy conference for next Monday to try to build a fire under the Republican congressional campaign.

Eisenhower also added appearances in Iowa and Kansas and a weekend stopover in Denver to his own Western campaign tour this month.

Invited to Monday's parley are

Vice President Richard Nixon, Republican National Chairman Meade ALCORN, GOP Finance Chairman Spencer Olin, and several congressional leaders.

## Reds Test Atoms Again

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union announced last night it has resumed nuclear test blasting after a six-month suspension.

The Soviet acknowledgement came within an hour after Washington had announced detection of the second pair of Soviet blasts this week. The first were Tuesday.

Talks will begin Oct. 31 at Geneva between the Soviet Union on one hand and Britain and the United States on the other to seek an agreement on suspending tests under adequate safeguards.

The U.S. State Department has said the United States would go ahead with its own plans to suspend nuclear tests Oct. 31 unless the Soviet Union held further tests after that date.

# Search for Gifted Students Offered

The University has offered to conduct a state-wide search for "more gifted" high school students—a search that may bring students of a higher academic quality here.

Under the Federal Education Act, funds are available to each state to help locate the more gifted students while they are still in high school.

Although this was not a direct recommendation of the 1957 Student Encampment, it would accomplish the same goal sought by the Encampment—a higher quality of students at the University.

Dr. Robert G. Bernreuter, special assistant to the president for student affairs, said the Univer-

sity had already been studying the plan but it is nice to receive a "pat on the back" from Encampment's similar recommendation.

The Academic Atmosphere Workshop of Encampment asked that the University require scholastic aptitude tests before students are accepted for admission. Bernreuter said the University could obtain the same results by surveying state high schools for the top notch students.

If the University would make a survey, he said, the information would be submitted to the state Department of Education and would then be available to any college or university.

Another recommendation along the same lines was to set up a merit system for rating high schools to serve as a basis for admitting students.

Such a system was used by the University about 15 years ago,

Bernreuter said, but it was too cumbersome to justify the efforts.

The atmosphere workshop also recommended better counseling through advisers. Bernreuter said the administration has been considering releasing professors from some teaching duties for more time to advise students, but extra funds that would be needed are not available.

## Schraer Given Grants For Bone Research

Two grants of \$7000 have been renewed by the U.S. Public Health Service to support Dr. Harald Schraer, research associate in physics, in his study of bone density.

Schraer received this assistance for his studies of the effect of fluorine on the bone density of living rats and the validity of measuring bone density by means

of a density computing machine.
