Robert LaBar, president of Agriculture Student Council, on Thursday asked All-University President Jay Feldstein to appoint a committee to arrange for the designing, erection, construction and maintenance of the new structure.

Ski Lessons To Be Given In November

The Ski Division of Outing Club will begin giving ski lessons for beginners in November near the water tower.

The beginner will learn basic positions and movements and will become familiar with his ski



equipment. Along with the dry land lessons, movies of expert skiers will be shown.

When the snow becomes deep enough for skiing, members of the ski division will take daily trips to Boalsburg and weekend trips to Ligonier. The Outing Club owns a one-third mile slope in Boalsburg equipped with a 1000-foot rope tow. Cross-country skiing is possible here.

Work parties have been organized to clean up the ski cabin, clear the ski trails and slope and put up the rope tow.

Members will take a ski tour of New England over the Christmas vacation, a mid-semester trip to Red House, N.Y., in the Allegheny State Park, and a trip over Easter vacation, possibly to New England.

The division has 18 pairs of skis, which it will rent to members.

The committee will consist of one member of the Artist or Lecture Series Committee, one member of Central Promotion Agency, one architecture student and one wood utilization student.

The construction, which is expected to begin next semester, will be done by a woodworking class under the direction of Fred L. Hoffman, assistant professor of industrial engineering.

The bulletin board will be constructed mainly of lumber purchased from the University sawmill and will be designed by the architecture student who will be a member of the committee. Portions of the present structure which can be salvaged will be used, as was proposed in a report by LaBar.

The committee will study the possibility of 2- and 3-dimension boards for the structure. It will also contact University architects for information on style and design limitations and arrange for the Division of Safety to inspect the present structure for soundness.

LaBar asked Cabinet to approve a \$175 budget for the bulletin board but Cabinet gave him permission to spend all that will be necessary for the structure.
