

Prof Views Soviet Youth Organization

Dr. James Gemmell, professor of education, who visited Russian business schools during an 8-day tour of the Soviet Union this summer, said he got the impression of a very organized youth movement quite different from that of Hitler,

which was based on hatred of other races.

Gemmell was granted a special visa to visit Russia while serving in Finland as a Fulbright lecturer.

"The Russians have no hatred in their hearts for outsiders," he said. "The curriculums in their schools are well saturated with the philosophy that the West is war-minded and that they mustn't hate the West but must convert it to the communistic way of thinking by exhibiting friendship."

Gemmell said he found the Russian students quite eager to learn about the West and, he said, they are given a partial chance to do this by reading American literature, although it is carefully screened.

"The Russian's curiosity about the outside and the West carries over into music," Gemmell said. "We could hear American jazz come from the music shops as we walked down the streets, but as yet rock 'n' roll hasn't become popular."

Speaking of the Russian school system, Gemmell said it is not necessary for the Russian students to work their way through school as some American students do because in Russia the state is responsible for education. A boy or girl with aptitude in a special field will be given a scholarship for advanced study in that field.

According to Gemmell, the Russian schools and the schools of Europe in general do not put as much emphasis on class attendance as American schools do.

"I find that if a Russian or European student doubts his professor's wisdom, he doesn't come to class," he said. "An American student would come to class and argue."

"Russian and European education is geared to the final examination and the student's ability to pass it. If a student can pass the final without coming to class, so much the better; however, if a student feels he is not ready to take the final he will not show up for it."

"I prepared a final exam for a course in a Finnish university and one out of 35 students came to take it," Gemmell said. "I had prepared five finals over a four months time before every student took it."

West Halls 'Snack Bar'

Petition Signed

Fifty-six men students have asked that the unauthorized early closing at night of the Waring Hall Snack Bar be stopped.

In a petition to Robert C. Proffitt, director of food service, the students asked that "the arbitrary and unauthorized" closing of the Snack Bar be stopped and that there be a sufficient stock of milk, ice cream and fruit juices on hand.

Another complaint was based on the "complete disregard" for the interests of the students on the part of employees of the snack bar.

The complete petition read: "We, the undersigned patrons of the Waring Hall Snack Bar, do hereby protest the arbitrary and unauthorized closing of above mentioned establishment at hours other than those posted. We further voice our dissatisfaction at the lack of sufficient stocks of milk, ice cream and fruit juices and the complete disregard for the interests of the students displayed by the employees of said establishment."

The petition was posted early this morning and by 4 p.m. today it had 56 signatures.

Lenbergs Selected Top Midshipman

Harold Lenbergs, sophomore in labor-management relations from Easton, was chosen the University's top third class midshipman by officers and first class midshipmen on the Navy ROTC cruise this summer.

Lenbergs has a Navy ROTC scholarship.

The ROTC men sailed to Rotterdam, Netherlands; Bergen, Norway; and Kiel, Germany. According to Lenbergs, they did everything from scrubbing decks to standing watch.

S.C. Council May Extend Garner Ave.

State College Borough Council voted 7-0 last night to write a resolution starting condemnation proceedings in order to extend Garner Avenue from East Beaver Avenue to East College Avenue.

The resolution, stating specific areas that need to be condemned, will be presented for the council's approval at its next meeting.

Councilman Lawrence Perez urged the starting of eminent domain proceedings on the properties of William H. Kauffman and Sidney Friedman. He warned that if they don't act, a traffic bottleneck will develop.

It was noted by several council members that because of past delay the properties had increased in value.

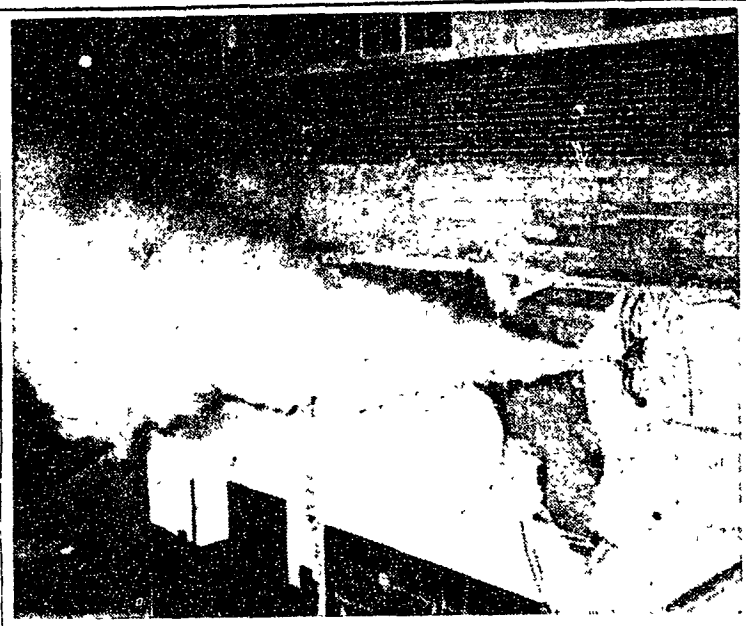
Councilman John O'Connor hesitated temporarily on the grounds that he didn't know if this was the proper way to conduct proceedings.

Councilman Eric A. Walker, president of the University, noted that condemnation proceedings are to determine a fair price.

In other business The Interfraternity Council encampment and Independent encampment were praised by Burgess Ray Anthony for their policy of cooperation with local police.

Council also accepted the paving contracts of Waring Avenue and voted to increase the accessible funds for the sewer authority.
