

Lawn Display Won by KDR

Kappa Delta Rho fraternity last night won the annual homecoming lawn display contest.

Pi Kappa Phi placed second and Sigma Alpha Epsilon was third.

The annual homecoming weekend contest was sponsored

by the Interfraternity Council. Kappa Delta Rho will receive the Alumni trophy at an alumni reception at noon today.

The innovation of movable parts in this year's contest added greatly to the interest and variation in the displays. James Hammerle, IFC committee chairman, said.

The winning display was a mock-up of the football field and stands. The cardboard and napkin display was in a U-shaped setting.

The card section was movable and "Welcome Alumni," "Welcome Marquette," "Lions," and "Scalp Marquette," slogans were alternately displayed by the white cards. Balloons and various colored napkins were dispersed among the "crowd."

Kappa Delta Rho placed second in 1958.

Pi Kappa Phi's display was a replica of Old Main and a moving arm extending from one of the wings of Old Main. Chimes played continually throughout the evening and the display was lighted in detail with Old Main.

On one side of the building was the huge axe-bearing arm which swung up and down into a teepee. A white surrender flag emerged from the teepee each time the axe struck.

The third place winner, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, built a 20-foot Lion and had it making a stew. Near the huge figure was a recipe for the Lion to follow.

The displays were judged by Mrs. Eric Walker; Hummel Fishburn, professor of music; Walter W. Trainer, head of the division of landscape; and Ralph T. McComb, University librarian.

Meters For Parking Are Suggested

All-University President Jay Feldstein has suggested to the administration that short-time parking meters be installed behind Simmons and McElwain Resident Halls.

In a letter to Elwood F. Olver, director of the Division of Security, Feldstein suggested the special meters to allow short-time parking to pick up dates, especially in the afternoons and evenings.

The special spaces are being sought because of the parking ban in front of Simmons and McElwain Halls.

He reported on the letter to All-University Cabinet Thursday night. Although Feldstein mailed it earlier this week, Olver said he has not received it and he did not want to comment until he does.

In requesting the parking meter system, Feldstein suggested that "about 20 or 25" parking permits for Area 40, behind Simmons and McElwain, be shifted to Area 46, the lot north of the new women's dormitories.

Feldstein told Cabinet he and Dean of Men Frank J. Simes surveyed the area and discovered there are enough vacancies to allow the shift.

2 Fraternities' Alums To See New Homes

Two fraternities will show off new houses to their alumni returning for today's homecoming game and weekend.

Alpha Rho Chi, a national architectural social fraternity, has moved into a converted 14-room residence at the corner of Foster Avenue and Pugh Street. Alpha Rho Chi was formerly at 220 E. Foster Avenue.

The second fraternity to acquire new living quarters is Omega Phi Psi which moved from 401 Clay Ave. to 546 S. Pugh St.

Alpha Rho Chi's house was entirely remodeled and decorated by the fraternity members. The downstairs contains three living rooms, a lounge and a library.

The living rooms are decorated in an Oriental motif complete with a floor-to-ceiling fireplace in both rooms.

The Oriental motif is carried out in pole lamps, love seats, slab couches and Japanese lanterns. The third room is used as a television and den-type room.

The fraternity members, 12 brothers and six pledges, do not eat in the fraternity; therefore, the former dining room has been converted into a lounge.

Omega Phi Psi's new home will

greatly increase the fraternity's space and living quarters. The new house has 11 bedrooms compared to six in the old house on Clay Avenue.

In addition to the bedrooms, the new house has a lounge, kitchen, dining room, chapter room and recreation room located in the basement. Both the inside and outside of the house have been completely repainted and renovations were made to the grounds and parking lot.

Seventeen students now live in the new house, Arnold Roane, fraternity president, said.

Roane said he expects about 12 alumni to return this weekend and a full program of events is planned, including an alumni meeting.
