

Rush Leads Panthers

Lion Harriers Set For Unbeaten Pitt

Penn State and Pitt—both undefeated in two cross-country meets so far this season—collide Saturday at the Schenley Oval in Pittsburgh, but the Panthers probably will not have a welcome mat out for the Lions in the Steel City.

Pitt opened the season with a 22-34-76 victory over Slippery Rock and Oberlin, with the Panthers' Ron Rush, John Christoff and Dale Fauser sweeping the first three places.

Last Saturday, Pitt crushed Ohio University, 15-45, with Rush, Christoff and Fauser being joined by teammates Micky Jupina and Vince Wojnar to sweep the first five places.

In the first two dual meets of the season, the Lions swamped Navy, 16-46, and Cornell, 17-42, and would like nothing better than to do the same sort of job on the Pitt harriers.

From last year's varsity squad which humbled the Panthers, 18-41, the Nittany hill-and-dalers have the first three finishers—Ed Moran, Capt. Fred Kerr and Dick Engelbrink—returning, plus the ninth and eleventh place finishers—Chick King and Sam White.

Returning for the Skyscraper University's varsity harriers are Rush (5th), Christoff (6th) and Wojnar (13th).

Not the least anxious to run against the Panthers is Engelbrink. Two years ago Rush beat the lanky Lion in the freshman meet, and since then Engelbrink has been determined to make a place for Rush—far in the dust. Like other Lions, Engelbrink has a long memory.

This is Olson's last semester at the helm of the Pitt cross-country and track teams. He retires after the harrier season after a long career that has seen such track greats as John Woodruff and Arnie Sowell under his tutelage.

Larry Digiacinto and Nick Malloy scored the other TD's for their club. John Righi was outstanding on the conversions, kicking four out of six.

Charles Brown intercepted a

blocked pass in the dwindling minutes of the game and scooted across the goal line to give Phi Delta Theta its margin of victory.

Earlier in the period Brown touched Bill Netzeof in his own end zone for a safety. A 25-yard run by Mike Chervenik on an intercepted pass gave Phi Kappa Tau its only score of the game. Bill Netzeof did some fine punting for the losers.

Captain Robert Dockstader kicked his game-winning field goal for the Fighting Fifth with 25 seconds remaining in the game.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon led by

Captain James Stopper and quarterback Jerry Bruce overcame a driving Phi Gamma Delta unit. Bruce pitched a one-yard pass to Jay Kirby early in the second half for the game's only score.

Pops Panthers got their second first down on the last play of the game with Thompson III to send the contest into overtime. Thereafter Pops made their vital first down on a 25-yard pass play across the mid-field stripe, which gave them the victory.

A fifty yard pass from Ed Date-mask to Larry Baker in the second period of play gave Pi Sigma Upsilon its percentage of victory.
