The purpose of Shaw's comedy ras the illumination of life—exwas the illumination of life-exposure of fatuous complacency, indicule of Victorian pharisaism and reduction to absurdity of conventional manners and morals.

In "Too True To Be Good," Shaw used the baldest elements of farce-melodrama to present a' view of humanity which, in all its absurdity, is a sharply definitive criticism of our species, Each prison in the play represents a certain type of person in our soourselves in them.

The cast will be headed by Mary Minkiewich as Sweetie, the ex-chambermaid; Ivan Ladizinsky as Aubrey Baggot, the gentleman burglar; and Pat Thompson as Miss Moppley, the invalid. Ladizinsky will also appear as a Bible-reading sergeant.

Others in the cast will be Len Tarnowski as Private Meek and the monster; Marta Harrison as Mrs. Moppley; and Ellis Grove as the doctor, Colonel Tallboys, and the Elder.

Warren Smith, associate professor of theatre arts, will direct the play. He has devised a method of staging the show, which is a combination of a regularly staged production and a drama quartet reading, to emphasize both the comic and serious portions. The inusual nature of the staging requires some members of the cast to portrav more than one role.
